Small Brown Beetle, the
Raspberry Byturus,
Attacking Buds

Abundant in York

Growers of Cultivated
Berry Advised To
Watch Plants

A small brown beetle, the raspberry byturus, is at present attacking the buds of cultivated and wild raspberry over a large portion of New Brunswick, being abundant in York, Northumberland, Gloucester, Restigouche, Madawaska, Victoria and Carleton counties, and probably over the whole province. The beetle feeds upon the flower buds, eating holes in the sides and destroying the fruit-producing portions.

Growers of cultivated raspberries are advised to watch their plants for signs of this insect. Warning is issued by the Division of Fields Crop and Garden Insects of the Department of Agriculture. When found, the beetles may be handpicked from small lots of bushes or shaken into a tub or pail containing water with a film of kerosene or gasoline on the surface. The plants may also be dusted before the blossoms open, using lead arsenate in powder form, either alone or diluted with seven parts of talc or diatomaceous earth. Raspberry foliage is sensitive to many dusts and sprays and the use of calcium arsenate, lime, or sulphur, is inadvisable. No arsenical poison spray or dust should be applied after the flowers of the raspberry open.

DOCTOR'S DEATH

Hospital Board Extends
Sympathy To Relatives
of Dr. A. Sterling

May Was Busy Month

Report of Supt. Shows
Present Year To Be a
Busy One

The Victoria Hospital Board at its regular monthly meeting held in the mayor's office of the city hall last night passed a resolution extending sympathy to the relatives of Dr. Allan Sterling, popular Fredericton physician who died recently. J. A. Reid, president, was in the chair and other members present at last night's meeting were Mrs. D. J. Shea, His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark, Alex. Davidson, Councillor Cameron, Mayor J. Walter Walker of Marysville, C. A. McVey, Dr. A. F. VanWart, and Miss Areta Gerow.

The superintendent's report for the month of May showed that there had been 480 patients admitted to the hospital during the present year, to date. This number is 23 more than last year at the same period. Medical services during the month were unusually heavy.

The report of the superintendent showed the following statistics: Number of patients in hospital on May 1, 37; number of patients admitted during the month, 95; number discharged, 93; patients in hospital at end of month, 39; medical cases admitted, 27; surgical cases admitted, 43; obstetrical cases admitted, 16; births 12; deaths, 15; contagious cases, none; died within forty eight hours, 4; major operations, 20; minor operations, 21; X-ray examinations, 69; maximum number of patients in one day, 47; minimum number of patients in one day, 26. Miss Townsley, a nurse, had completed her course of training it was further reported.

A. & B. CLUB MEETING

The June meeting of the A. & B. Club took place last evening with H. W. Woods in the chair. Seventeen members were present and fifteen new members were elected to the club. Communications were read from the Saint John Power Boat club, stating that the club is leaving for Fredericton on July 13 for the usual summer water sports programme. Regret was expressed at the death of two members of the Fredericton Club, Dr. Allan Sterling, who was commodore of the club, and also C. Robert Hawkins. It was moved and seconded that the secretary write a letter of condolence to the families of Dr. Sterling and C. R. Hawkins. After passing of the usual accounts, the meeting adjourned.

REVISORS COURT

About one hundred and twenty additional names have been added to polling district No. 1 in this city, and approximately twenty have been deleted, according to a statement today by Major J. S. Scott, York county secretary treasurer, who held revisors court here yesterday. The additions come under the coming of age clause as well as new arrivals in the city, and the objections filed are because of deaths, residents moved away, or those under age. Court will sit here next Monday again when District No. 2 will be dealt with.

RAIN IN CENTRAL N. B.

The bonds were sold to the firms of George W. Brown and Company, and Eastern Securities, Limited, acting together, and are for twenty years at 4 1-2 per cent and the successful bid was 99 1-2.

Mayor A. J. McEvoy was in the chair and the aldermen present were Henry, Boone, Dobie, Bailey, Flower, and Young. Bills and accounts for the month were passed and reports were received from the various committees.

The contract for the Lake dam was let to Fred Pond, who is at work on the fill at the present time. A request for lights for Gill Street was left to the chairman of the fire and water committee. Ald. Boone, who will proceed with the work.
