

THEATRE OF THE AIR

AN ELABORATE JUBILEE BROADCAST

H. M. King George Will Speak Over An Empire Broadcast—Seven Continuous Hours of Special Programs—Six Programs, Three of which Originate in London, Eng.—Coast to Coast Hook-up Will Link All Parts of Canada and Heart of Empire.

OTTAWA, April 27—Assisting in Canada's celebrations of the King's Jubilee on May 6th, the Canadian Radio Commission, with the co-operation of the British Broadcasting Corporation, will broadcast more than seven continuous hours of special programs over its coast-to-coast network. Commencing at 11:00 A. M., A. S. T., and lasting until 5:00 P. M., A. S. T., six different programs, three of which will originate in London, to be relayed to Canada by the trans-Atlantic telephone system, will comprise the broadcast.

Featuring colorful festivities as loyal subjects throughout Canada pay homage to their Sovereign, the official Jubilee ceremonies on Parliament Hill will be heard by radio listeners, also bands in the provincial capitals of the Dominion simultaneously playing the same musical selections; a verbal chain of nine lieutenant governors of the Provinces; the proceedings in London and the voice of His Majesty. There will be heard an unusual dramatization called "Canadian Cavalcade", a retrospect of the highlights of the

past quarter century since the ascension of King George; an address to be delivered in London by Rudyard Kipling, and the service in St. Paul's Cathedral in London which will be attended by Their Majesties. During the evening the Radio Commission will present musical programs appropriate to the occasion.

At 11:00 o'clock in the morning the official Jubilee ceremonies as they take place on Parliament Hill in Ottawa will be broadcast. With the carillon in the Peace Tower and church bells throughout the city blending in joyful music, a Royal Salute of twenty-one guns will be fired, following which will be delivered messages from His Excellency the Governor General the Acting Prime Minister, and the Leader of the Opposition in Parliament. At the conclusion of the presentation of Jubilee medals there will be heard a massed choir singing a number of patriotic songs. The march past will bring the ceremonies to a close.

From 12:00 noon to 1:30 P. M., the Commission will present a special broadcast called "Canada in 1935". Of a spectacular and unusual nature, the program will be a panoramic picture of Canadian personalities, places, and affairs. Bonds in the capital cities of the Canadian provinces, synchronized in the playing of "O Canada" and "The Maple Leaf Forever" will play in accordance with the time set by a key metronome set beating from Ottawa. Forming a verbal chain from the Atlantic to the Pacific, the nine lieutenant governors will extend brief Jubilee messages on behalf of the provinces.

One of Canada's oldest citizens will recall pioneer days in Canada and will later be joined in telephone conversation with one of Canada's youngest citizens. Neither of them will have ever seen or talked with each other before. They will meet for the first time on the Commission's national network.

Jack Miner To Speak

From Kingsville, Ontario, the famous Canadian naturalist, Jack Miner, will speak directly from his bird sanctuary. He will describe and imitate the various calls known to millions of birds as a signal of friendship and a promise of a safe harbour.

During the same broadcast, Victoria, capital of British Columbia, will be linked for the first time with the facilities of the Canadian Radio Commission by means of a submarine cable stretching from the mainland to Vancouver Island, ninety miles distant. From there, Audrey Alexandra Brown, talented invalid Canadian poet, who is attracting international attention, will be interviewed and will read a special Jubilee poem which she has written for the occasion at the request of the Radio Commission.

Canadians, representative of the major industries of the Dominion, will be given the opportunity to express themselves to the national audience. Among them will be Angus Walters, skipper of the world-famous fishing and racing schooner, "Bluepeace", Queen of the Atlantic fishing fleet, who will sail his vessel up from Lunenburg to Halifax to speak on the occasion. From Montreal will be broadcast an interview with the champion farmer of the province of Quebec; from Toronto a famous prospector representing the mining industry of Ontario will speak; from the Prairie Provinces will be heard Dr. Seager Wheeler, of Rosthern, Saskatchewan, wheat king twenty-five years ago; from Vancouver a pioneer British Columbia lumberman will be interviewed.

Novel Interviews
Climaxing this ninety-minute kaleidoscope review of Canada and Canadian affairs will be interviews with the man on the street by the Canadian Radio Commission's inquiring reporter. A Commission microphone

will be placed on Ste. Catherine St., in Montreal, main thoroughfare in the heart of this busy metropolis. From this vantage point Canadians from coast to coast will be enabled to feel the heartbeat of Canada as the inquiring reporter informally interviews the random passersby.

Military bands from the capital cities of Canada will in turn contribute selected musical numbers. The program will terminate with bands from coast to coast synchronized in the playing of "The Maple Leaf Forever".

From 1:30 to 3:05 P. M., a broadcast of ceremonies in London, England, will be heard and this will be of major importance inasmuch as during it His Majesty will deliver a Jubilee message. Other features to be heard during this period will be a review of His Majesty's twenty-five years of reign; messages from loyal subjects throughout the Empire, and formal messages from acting heads of Empire governments.

At 3:05 P. M., the scene will again change to Canada when the Commission will present the "Canadian Cavalcade". The dramatic content of this include such items as the burning of the Parliament Buildings at Ottawa in 1916, the death of King Edward, Halley's Comet, and many of the outstanding happenings of the past twenty-five years.

From 4:00 to 5:00 P. M., there will be broadcast from London an address by Rudyard Kipling before the Royal Society of St. George. This will be followed by a broadcast of thanksgiving services direct from St. Paul's Cathedral in London which will be attended by Their Majesties.
