**Native of Newcastle Dies in New York**

NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 12.—Hedley V. S. Parker, a native of Newcastle, N. B., who was known as "Captain" Parker during the 41 years he served as marine editor of New York papers, died at his home yesterday. For the last three years he had been on leave of absence from The Sun. He was 79.

"Captain" Parker was editor of ship news on The World during an early period when it carried two full pages of information about incoming and outgoing ships every day. For more than 30 years he cabled a daily report on United States marine affairs to Lloyd's in London. The United States government frequently consulted his files for information on shipping and foreign trade.

"Captain" Parker came to the United States from New Brunswick in his early 20's. From the ranks of news compositors he went to the editorial staff of The World. When that paper was absorbed by The Tribune he went to The Sun.

His widow, Maude E. Parker, survives.

**DISCOVERY IN APPLE NUTRITION**

Recent investigations conducted by the Horticultural Division of the Dominion Experimental Station here have revealed the interesting fact that the application of boron to apple trees exercises an important controlling effect upon a physiological disorder, termed corky core. This disorder is one of a series which has baffled scientists for years. Its cause has been unknown, although its occurrence has usually been associated with improper moisture condition in the soil. In a province such as New Brunswick, where irrigation is not practised, moisture conditions are practically entirely beyond human control.

**ANOTHER BOUQUET**

Another tribute has been paid to New Brunswick's capital city on its beauty. The party of twelve touring British educationists who were entertained here yesterday, found Fredericton to be "the most beautiful city in Canada." Prior to arriving here, one of the educationists declared, "we found Victoria, B.C., to be the prettiest city, but Fredericton even surpasses the western city from point of natural beauty." Before leaving here for St. John early last evening one of the party expressed himself as greatly pleased with the reception given the touring educationists during their stay here yesterday.
