

BALLOT BOXES ALL MAILED TO ELECTION POLLS

Advance Poll at McAdam Closes Tonight at 10.00 O'Clock

Marking Ballots

All Deputy Returning Officers for City Named

All arrangements for voting on Monday had been practically completed today at the office of Sheriff Roy Smith, returning officer for York-Sunbury. All ballot boxes, with instructions for deputy returning officers had been mailed to the various polls in both counties today at noon.

Voting in the advance poll at McAdam was continuing today and the poll will close tonight at 10 p.m. The ballots, however, will not be counted until the regular polls have been closed on Monday. All customs offices in the Dominion will close at 1.00 p.m. Monday to allow the customs officials time to vote.

The corrected lists of voters have been received from Ottawa and are now on their way to the various deputy returning officers throughout the constituency.

Some questions previous have arisen amongst electors as to the correct way to mark their ballots, said the returning officer today. He pointed out that they should be marked with an X at the end of the candidate's name for whom they are voting—not over the name. There is a blank space after the name of each candidate on the ballot reserved for the mark which is to be made only with the pencil supplied in the polling booth.

All the deputy returning officers are now ready to take their positions at the polls on Monday. The last to file their acceptance papers are as follows:

Plans Extensive Work

Recreation Institute to Stress Social, Physical Education

Community Y.M.C.A. activities for this city will be spurred during the fall and winter, in all probability, by the recreation institute which is to be conducted here during next week. The recreation institute is being held for the purpose of explaining and directing courses for young people and emphasis will be placed on the social side as well as the physical, according to Ralph Albrant, the local Y.M.C.A. instructor.

In conjunction with the proposed recreation institute, Fredericton will be visited next week by James S. Summers, dean of physical education of South America Y. M. C. A. training school in Montevideo. Mr. Summers will deliver significant addresses on Y. M. C. A. work, stressing how the work is conducted in Montevideo. The aim behind such recreation institute proceedings is to evolve a program of "creative recreation" with social and physical both getting their proper emphasis.

Church Meeting

A meeting is being held in Wilnot United church on Sunday evening at which representative groups of leaders of boys groups and scout leaders will be present. The meeting will take place at 8.30 o'clock at which time the fall and winter program of Y.M.C.A. work will be planned for this city. One of the things planned is physical classes between four and six o'clock each day of the week.

The recreation institute next week is especially directed towards laymen leaders of recreation who are in charge of mixed groups and young people's clubs. All those interested in recreational leadership are invited to attend.

G. F. BRIDGES NEW CHAIRMAN FOREST COMM.

Several Other Changes Announced by Premier Dysart Here Today—Premier at Andover Tonight.

Several changes in the personnel of the New Brunswick Forest Products Commission were announced today by Hon. A. A. Dysart premier and Minister of Public Works. Gregory F. Bridges of Moncton has been named chairman of the commission, succeeding A. B. Gilbert of Saint John, who has resigned. The premier stated that W. R. Wallace, Reynolds, Northumberland County, will continue as a member of the commission. He also stated that Ora M. Dvaies of Grand Falls has been prominently mentioned to succeed W. R. Richards of Campbellton. G. H. Prince, Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines, who has occupied the position of registrar for several years will continue in that position. The commission, which has not met since before the provincial election, is expected to meet shortly, the premier stated.

The premier leaves this afternoon for Andover where he will speak this evening in the interests of the Liberal candidate, J. E. J. Patterson of Andover. The premier expects to return to his home in Buctouche tomorrow where he will remain during the election on Monday. He will return to Fredericton to attend the Government meeting on October 16.

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HIGH SCHOOL TO ORGANIZE DRAMA SOCIETY

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K. C. Bishop and Miss Pearl Ross in Charge—Fine Response

A Dramatic Society has been organized at the Fredericton high school. At a meeting held on Friday afternoon the encouraging number of fifty-seven members responded to the call. K. C. Bishop was elected director and Miss Pearl Ross, assistant director. Both these teachers have previously taken an active interest in promoting the dramatic talent of the school and to them is due much of the credit for the starting of this organization.

The new Society proposes to meet once a week, the meetings lasting for one hour after school. The aims and objects of the new Society are: first, to find out what dramatic talent there is in the school and to utilize the same for social concerts and plays; also to give the students a training in control and poise when they appear before the public, and to teach them and encourage them in public speaking and self-confidence. The new scheme should form an important feature of the high school course as it will embrace dialogue, recitation, reading and silent acting impersonations.

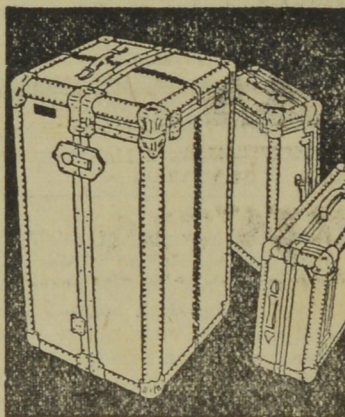
It is encouraging to see the students in such large numbers responding to the call made by Mr. Bishop in connection with this worthy work.

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REGISTRATIONS IN VOCATIONAL WORK ENLARGED

Vocational Director Reports Special Increase in Commercial

Girls' Home Making

Leader Returns from Inspection Trip of North Shore High Schools

W. K. Tibert, Director of Vocational Education in New Brunswick, who returned yesterday from an inspection visit to the Composite High Schools at Newcastle and Campbellton, reports that registrations in the Vocational High School departments of these schools is the largest in their history. The increase is especially noticeable in the Commercial departments due to so many graduates of the Academic high schools applying for special courses. It is to be regretted that these students were not directed into the Commercial high school on leaving Grade VIII. Then a fourth year would not have been necessary and the training they would have received would have been superior to what can be given by condensing a three year course to one year.

Special Course

Another special course in these schools is a course in home-making for girls who have been out of school for one or more years. The entrance requirements are simple and the girls are not compelled to take any academic subjects as such. They spend eleven hours per week in the class room and receive instructions in foods, household accounting, clothing, theory of foods, household administration and textiles. The use of correct English is particularly stressed and an effort is made to create a taste for good literature.



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
