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Committee Meets

Griffith, Director of the Bureau of Information.

"It was stated by Mr. Loudoun, that the items shown as special warrants for expenditure in excess of Legislative appropriations 1934, that part of these expenditures both in the Current and Capital Accounts, and which have been criticised in the Budget Debate, were not incurred in the fiscal year 1934, but were the result of expenditures met since the fiscal year ended.

"Your Committee recommends that in future these items be segregated, and charged to the years in which the expense incurred.

"Your Committee recommends to the Comptroller General that if possible, condensed balance sheets covering current year's work, including therein estimates and expenditures, and condensed balance sheet showing Capital Account, be brought together in as condensed a form as possible in the beginning of the report.

"Mr. Sinclair, Chairman, and Mr. Doucette, Member, of the Workmen's Compensation board, appeared before the Government explaining various items and policies. It was pointed out unless there is an improvement in accident record of Lumbering Account, the assessment will have to be raised very materially.

"Mr. Sinclair explained the cash funds of the Board are subject to continuous audit by an independent auditor. Under this system no cash shortage could develop without being discovered. Mr. Sinclair said there have never been a cash shortage to his knowledge.

"Some accounts of Mr. D. Leo Dolan, Director of Publicity, in connection with New England's Sportsmen's Show held in Boston during the winter of 1934, were under discussion. Mr. Dolan is now in Ottawa, and found it impossible to come before the Committee in explanation of these items, although in fairness to Mr. Dolan it must be stated that there was a letter on file, attached to his vouchers, in which he offered to give the Comptroller General ex-

planation of any items that might be questioned. It was also shown that Mr. Dolan, as Director of Publicity for the Province, was given a cash advance of Eight Hundred Dollars to make disbursements in connection with this Show, and the established precedent in the past gave the Director very wide powers in his method of securing publicity.

"It is recommended that the Comptroller General write to Mr. Dolan getting further information regarding the Advertising Club Dinner held on January 30, 1934, as this seemed to be the principal item on which not much detailed information was given.

"It was impossible, with the time at the disposal of your Committee, to examine every voucher in connection with every Department, as after all it takes a staff of auditors, who have already gone over this work some two months to do this detail work. The course adopted by your Committee, therefore, was to have each Member thoroughly examine the record of the Public Accounts as published in the report and then—if additional information was required—vouchers and supporting documents were made available to the Members whenever asked for.

"Your Committee recommend the payment of Five Dollars to E. Vane Couthard in connection with the typing of this report."



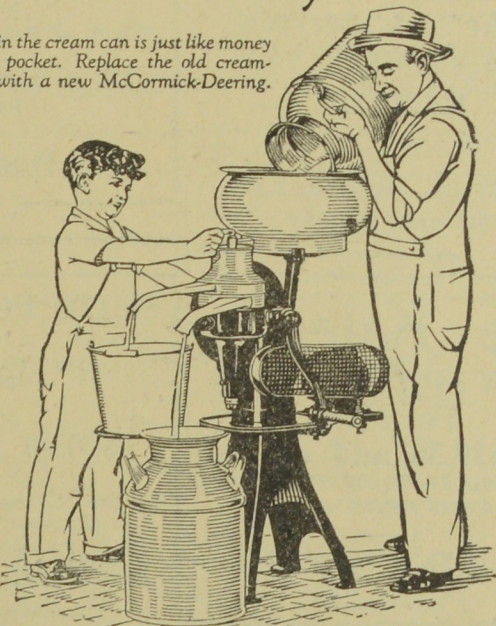
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
