

PROVINCIAL CELEBRATION TO BE HELD HERE

City Council and Provincial Government Will Collaborate

Government Meeting

Mayor and City Council Discussed the Matter Last Evening

At the conclusion of the provincial government meeting here last night, Premier L. P. D. Tilley announced that the official celebration by New Brunswick of the King's Silver Jubilee will be held in this city on May 6, which has been declared a special holiday for the event.

The city council in special meeting last night anticipated this action on the part of the government and laid plans for a monster celebration to be held in the capital on that day.

The government at its meeting appointed Charles N. Vroom, of St. Stephen to be police and stipendiary magistrate for the town of Milltown. George V. Forsythe, of Saint John, was appointed a provincial constable at the same time.

In conjunction with the celebration to be held in the capital for the King's Silver Jubilee, another meeting is to be held by the city council on April 5 and various organizations are expected to solicit their individual plans for the holiday.

Mayor W. G. Clark said last night he had interviewed both the premier and Hon. Dr. Murray MacLaren, lieutenant governor, and both would be in Fredericton for the celebration.

Also, Major T. C. Barker, officer commanding the 90th Field Battery (Howitzer), and Lieutenant Colonel E. J. Lounsbury, V.D., officer commanding the New Brunswick Dragoons, had been in touch with him concerning the part which the militia will take in the celebration. Permission had been given by the military authorities at Ottawa for a royal salute to be fired in Fredericton on that day, and for the militia generally to take part in the celebration.

The officers were required to notify Ottawa before March 23, however, if the city desired their services.

May 6 already has been proclaimed a public holiday and it has been suggested that the N. B. Board of Education will undoubtedly declare it a school holiday in the province.

MARKET FLUCTUATION

The recent European crisis has caused violent fluctuations in the London fur market this week. F. A. Tweedie (Northumberland, Opposition) stated here this morning that during any critical international situation there had been drops of 5 to 15 percent in the price of furs in the London market.

GOLF CLUB DINNER

At the annual supper meeting of the Fredericton Golf Club held last evening A. J. Thompson was elected president of the club, succeeding H. S. Murray. Other officers elected were as follows: vice president, D. W. Wallace; management committee, E. O. Turner, C. F. Bailey, J. D. MacKay, H. S. Murray, R. FitzRandolph and B. H. Kinghorn. Committee reports were received and the financial condition of the club was shown to be quite favorable. The secretary and treasurer, who were not appointed last night, will be named at a meeting of the management committee to be held soon.

GREAT INCREASE IN INSURANCE ON GOVT. BUILDINGS

Insurance Is Increased Four times, with Premium Reduction

Present Figure \$700,000

Installation of Sprinkler System Brings About Great Saving

The total insurance on the provincial government buildings at present amounts to \$700,000 as against an insurance of \$178,000 before the present sprinkler system was installed, stated a report made by A. W. Barbour, deputy minister of Public Works, to the Public Accounts Committee this morning. The report read by the chairman, A. D. Taylor, government member from Sunbury, further stated that this immense increase in insurance had been obtained at a reduction of some \$840.00 in premiums. The premium paid by the government on the old \$178,000 policy amounted to \$3,360 and the premium on the present insurance of \$700,000 is \$2,520. This vast savings in insurance was brought about by the installation of a fire preventive sprinkler system recently installed in the buildings at a cost of approximately \$27,000.

W. A. Loudoun, comptroller-general, appeared before the committee this morning to answer certain questions regarding expenditures by special warrant. J. K. King, deputy minister of agriculture, will attend the meeting on Thursday to address the members on expenditures in his department.

Dr. W. W. White, government member from Saint John City, suggested that a summarized report of the Public Accounts be made for the sake of simplifying the report. He stated that a small pamphlet would be a good thing.

Insurance

The insurance of the government buildings and contents was discussed. The total insurance carried on the property now is \$700,000 as against an insurance of \$178,000 before the present sprinkler system was installed. The premium paid now is \$2,520 as against a former premium of \$3,360. Thus with a reduction of \$840 in premiums the government is getting about four times the protection, because of the added security of the sprinkler system, which cost approximately \$27,000.

W. A. Loudoun

W. A. Loudoun, comptroller general, appeared before the committee to explain certain expenditures by special warrant. Mr. Loudoun explained that there is an unadjusted account between the city of Saint John and the provincial government. This account was one of the Board of Pensioners accounts under The Intoxicating Liquor Act.

The comptroller general stated that of the \$236,947.00 listed under capital expenditure, approximately \$123,000 was expended on bridges and roads after the close of the fiscal year, leaving some \$113,000 applicable to the fiscal year ending Oct. 31, 1934. Mr. Loudoun explained that the work of repairing bridges has to continue all through the year and the showing of special expenditures were shown up to the meeting of the Legislature. He stated that the Audit Act required that expenditures in excess of legislators be listed up to the beginning of the session.

Dr. M. L. Jewett enquired about the over-expenditure of \$30,107.96 on the Provincial Hospital. The largest item under this account was \$26,305.64 spent on the grounds and the building.

TWO CASES TO BE RE-ARGUED IN APPEAL COURT

Adjourned Sitting Will Have Important Cases Before It

Sits Tomorrow

Minnie Bell Noble vs the Bath, Bristol and Florenceville Hydro Com.

The New Brunswick Appeal Court will sit here tomorrow to hear re-argument in two cases which were adjourned from the November term of the court. Chief Justice J. B. M. Baxter and Mr. Justice Grimmer will sit on the cases.

The first action is that of Minnie Bell Noble vs. The Bath, Bristol and Florenceville Hydro Electric District Commissioner, in which Jones & Jones of Woodstock are appearing for the defendant, and P. J. Hughes, K. C., of this city for the plaintiff. The action concerns the claim for damages by Minnie Bell Noble, widow, for the death of her husband, who was allegedly electrocuted by a wire in the cellar of his home, the wiring being done by the defendant company.

The second case is in the matter of the estate of John Thompson McGuire, deceased. Appeal is from the judgment of the Probate Court of Charlotte county.

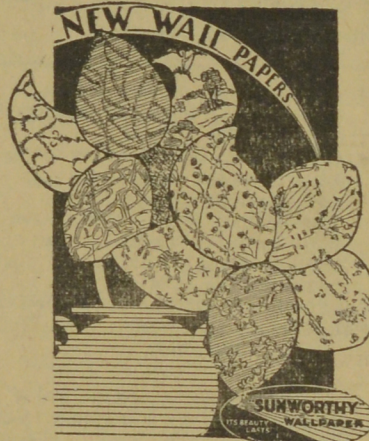

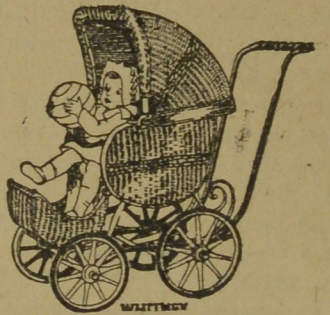
