TIBBETT TO MARK TEN YEARS AS THE FOREMOST STAR

Baritone Is First American Man Singer To Reach Great Heights in Opera.

Lawrence Tibbett will mark his tenth year as an outstanding Metropolitan Opera star on today. It was on the second day of 1925 that an unknown young baritone from California received the greatest ovation ever accorded a new singer. Previous to this sensational performance, which catapulted him to permanent stardom, Tibbett had appeared mostly in secondary roles.

For years foreigners had dominated the artists' roster in American opera. Not until Tibbett came along did a native man singer ever achieve top rank stardom in the operatic field. Vincent Ballester was scheduled to sing the role of Ford in Verdi's "Falstaff" on January 2, 1925, but a few days before he took ill. Tibbett was assigned as his substitute. With the aid of Wilfred Pelletier, who now conducts the accompanying orchestra on his Tuesday night broadcasts over NBC, he learned the part. What happened was musical history, and Tibbett became a star overnight.

Subsequently he scored triumphs in the concert, radio and motion picture fields, and today he easily qualifies as "America's Foremost Singer." The presence of Tibbett on the Metropolitan roster has not been the least factor in the popularization of grand opera during the past few years. In the first place he is living refutation of the theory that opera singers are short and fat. In the second place he has been an important factor in having opera sung in English and based on American themes. He has appeared in every English-speaking opera at the Met in the past ten years.
