The population of Canada is small comparatively. It will be seen that our death-rate is not yet as great as is the death-rate for England and Wales but we dare prophesy that, unless a different form of research is followed here, our figures will soon reach a like appalling height.

As cancer is attributed, by very many honourable and well-known medical men, to errors in our mode of life, our food, our want of air and exercise, it is not time to take up again the neglected study of the medicinal herbs with which the Creator has blessed this earth and its inhabitants? They are there in their thousands, at our doors, waiting to surrender their information when rigidly sought.

Is it not time that our prepared foods, and their actions on the human blood, were investigated? Is it not time that the evil resulting from want of fresh air and exercise was exposed to the public and impressed upon them? Many modern doctors, of the pro-vivisection school, seem to think it all right if they can only inoculate the population, injecting fifth into the blood-stream of young and old, with the witches' idea of making it pure.

Good food, cleanliness, fresh air and water, combined with exercise, are, in our opinion, the things needed to keep the population healthy. Given these, the attacks of the scourge of cancer will become fewer and fewer, because less punishment will be required.

If a cancer-research by means of animal experimentation be instituted

## WIPE OUT POOL ROOMS IN U.S. IS PLANNED

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 12—Plans to wipe out the pool rooms in the United States have been formulated and Senator Morris Sheppard of Texas will introduce the bill.

If the petition becomes law, it will sound the death knell of the operators. The federal measure will prevent telegraph, radio or telephone companies from interstate dissemination of racing news and from transporting to any person, poolroom, barroom, saloon, restaurant, gambling house or other place outside racing enclosures where speculation and wagering has been legal.

This means that track conditions, scratches, probable jockeys and other things that would add to the maintenance of pool rooms and hand books would be illegal under that law.

NORWAY LAND OF  
WINTER SPORTS

MONTREAL, March 11—Norway, the land of winter sports, invigorating climate and sunshine, is attracting each year more visitors from North America, where life in the open among the hills and mountains make for rest and recreation for body and mind, according to the Norwegian America Line, which is represented in Canada by the Canadian National Railways System.

Good railroad communications from the principal ports bring within reach many fine up to date winter resorts, whose hotels provide excellent food and service at moderate prices. Each Saturday and Sunday during the entire winter season, national and international sports events, such as skiing and skating contests attract unusual attention. Of these the most important and picturesque competition is the annual Holmenkollen Ski Festival, which has attained fame throughout Europe. Competitors from all parts participate in increasing numbers and Holmenkollen Day is regarded by many as the event of the season. This contest takes place in the latter part of February or early in March and is usually favored by most delightful weather conditions which tend to make the day unforgettable in witnessing an exciting sport from a comfortable point of vantage. But aside from special events, all kinds of winter sports may be indulged in to the fullest extent in Norway up to and is usually favored by most delectable when the skiing season reaches its height of popularity. The months of March and April being the best time for skiing in the Norwegian mountains, the opportunity is taken by all classes during the Easter holidays to indulge in their favorite pastime, skiing, the national sport of Norway. During this period carnivals, concerts, dances and sport competitions are arranged by the tourist hotels and every day throughout the whole winter season brings some interesting indoor or outdoor event, as listed in a folder entitled "Events in Norway 1935."

The Norwegian America Line announce three convenient sailings from New York for those interested in visiting Norway during the winter and early spring, these being by the S. S. "Borgensfjord" February 27, the S. S. "Stavangertjord" March 20 and the S. S. "Borgensfjord" April 3.

Production in the prepared breakfast foods and other cereal products industry in 1933 included 47,275,059 pounds of prepared foods (corn flakes, bran flakes, wheat flakes, shredded wheat, muffins, force, etc.) valued at \$6,334,399; unprepared cereal products \$152,796, and all other products \$303,744. The total output of "prepared breakfast foods" in 1933 (including those produced in the flour milling industry) was 56,426,549 pounds valued at \$7,361,550. Such unprepared cereals as oatmeal and rolled oats which are exclusively produced in the flour milling industry are not included in this report.

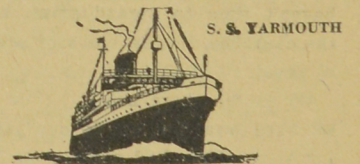
