

## HUXLEY, WORLD FAMED SCIENTIST, IN CITY TODAY

Collaborator With H. G. Wells in Biology Work, To Lecture Here

Visits U. N. B.

Spoke to Science Group At University This Afternoon

Julian S. Huxley, one of the foremost living biologists who is lecturing here tonight under the auspices of the National Council of Education, arrived here on the noon train from Montreal.

The famous scientist had luncheon today with General F. W. Hill and this afternoon he lectured briefly to a small group of science students at the University of New Brunswick. After his arrival this morning, Mr. Huxley was shown through the college buildings.

Mr. Huxley is a brother of the brilliant novelist, Aldous Huxley, an grandson of T. H. Huxley, the eminent scientific thinker of the nineteenth century who was a contemporary and kindred spirit to Darwin. It is expected that Mr. Huxley's subject tonight at the Normal School where he is to lecture, will be along the line of Science and the Social World, or the place of science in modern life.

Mr. Huxley, who is completing a lecture tour of the Dominion of Canada, will sail from Saint John on Friday for the Old Country. The famous scientist's most recent work has been his collaboration with H. G. Wells and his son, G. P. Wells, in the monumental biological treatise, "The Science of Life".

## MANY OPPOSE BILL RE CHANGE CIVIC GOVT.

Large Petition Opposing Bill Presented by Hon. W. H. Harrison

Applies to Saint John

County Officials From Gloucester Confer with Government

A petition signed by some five thousand citizens of the City of Saint John opposing a bill to be introduced in the House this week, was presented by Hon. W. H. Harrison, K.C., Attorney-General, in the Legislature today. The bill, which will probably be introduced in the House late today or tomorrow, is intitled An Act to authorize a change in the Civic Government of the City of Saint John. It is expected that the bill will go before the Municipalities Committee for consideration on Friday.

J. H. A. L. Fairweather, K.C., government member from Kings county, continued the debate on the budget this afternoon, and it is expected that there will be a night session tonight.

### Government Meeting

B. C. Mullins, secretary-treasurer for Gloucester county, Councillor Jerry Mazerall, and Dr. W. H. Coffyn, M. P. P. from Gloucester, were a delegation which conferred with the government this morning regarding unemployment relief in Gloucester county. Secretary-Treasurer Mullins stated to The Daily Mail at noon that nothing has as yet developed from the conference, but it is expected that they will confer further with the government today.

### HELD BUSY MEETING

The regular monthly meeting of the Victorian Order of Nurses was held yesterday with J. Bacon Dickson in the chair and a good attendance of members. The usual reports of the treasurer and nurses were given which showed that a great deal of work had been done. The nurses report showed the following statistics: 80 cases nursed; 60 new cases; 341 nursing visits; in school work, assisting medical school inspector Dr. Cameron showed 938 pupils examined; 120 of these referred to home physician; 12 excluded; 5 sent to Rotary Glasses Clinic; 19 to Gyro Dental Clinic. The meeting was mostly routine. Attendance at the Well Baby Conference in Fredericton and Devon were shown to number 264. In Devon the ladies of the Advent Church and the Women's Institute served tea to the mothers. In Fredericton this was done by Picardy Chapter of the I.O.D.E.

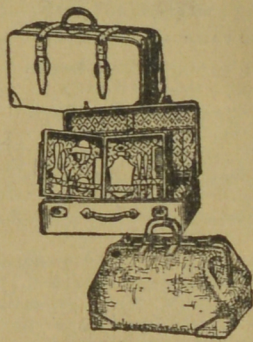

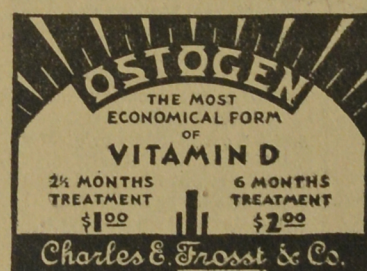
