## YPRES NEWSPAPER PRINTED IN WAR

EDMONTON, Alta., June 21—A full fledged newspaper, the "Star Shell" was published in shell torn Ypres in July, 1916, and the sheet had a total circulation of 30 copies. Orville Palmer, now a member of the Edmonton Bulletin composing room staff, was largely responsible for printing the paper and setting the type—by hand. The paper was published "under the auspices of the 43rd Battalion Brass Band" and observed the date line, "Somewhere, Wednesday, July 12, 1916." Besides news items the paper had two columns headed, "What We Would Like to Know," and "Society Notes." The leading article carried this explanation and apology:

"Having been fortunate enough to discover a printing machine, complete with type, against the ruins of (censored), one of the boys' conceived the brilliant notion of printing a souvenir paper. Hence the reason for this issue."

"I have been asked by the printing 'boss' to apologize for the typographical effort as he has to work under difficulties, being under shell fire. The type is not everything that could be desired owing to 'Fritz' having dropped a few 'H. E.'s (high explosives) and shells of various other calibre on our composing room, thereby covering everything with lime and plaster."

## 'DOCTOR' SUSPECT TO FACE VICTIMS

BOSTON, Mass., June 21—A well-dressed man with a stethoscope in his pocket, found unconscious yesterday on the B. & M. tracks in Belmont will face Cambridge residents recently victimized by a bogus doctor. Cambridge police said last night.

Inspector Thomas Carroll and Frank McLaughlin of Cambridge police questioned the man, who refused to identify himself, or to answer questions. Doctors at Cambridge hospital where he is recovering said the man apparently had been drugged. Police said a stethoscope was one of the properties used by a fake physician.

## WHEAT STOCKS IN STORE

Canadian wheat in store on June 14 amounted to 199,207,863 bushels compared with 200,334,069 the week before, and 194,626,562 a year ago. Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 9,347,363 bushels as 9,603,316 the week before and 7,330,896 last year. Wheat in transit on the lakes was reported as 2,469,165 bushels compared with 3,100,256 the week before. United States wheat in Canada was shown as 95,294 compared with two bushels a year ago.

## Arid Area Shelters Last of Wild Cattle

One of the last stands in the United States where wild cattle roam is in and around an area of 3,600 square miles about 90 miles southwest of Tonopah, Nevada. It is known as 40-Mile Canyon—the Indians call it "The Silent Land".

It is a wild, desolate spot and almost devoid of vegetation; it has never been surveyed and remains unexplored except by a few hardy prospectors and the Indians, and, due to a lack of water, they never penetrate it very far.

The herd of cattle recently discovered there, says the Christian Science Monitor, are as wild and unbranded as the struggling herds of antelope that still roam certain portions of the state. Just who may have owned the cows from which these wild creatures multiplied is not known.

Apparently there is water somewhere in this area of rocks, and sand that has never been located by the Indians, as the wild cattle are in excellent condition. One tonapah prospector reports that he succeeded in getting within rifle range of two young bulls and enjoyed the first fresh meat he had eaten for several months.
