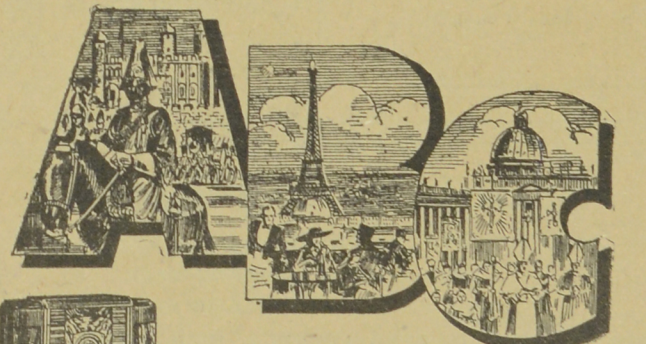
Police. He has appeared before the

tors.**Boys Testify**Nelson Kelly, aged 15, told of find-
ing the body of Patrick Dempsey

they came on Dempsey's body, lying
on the ground, face down.Coroner Ellis was the last witness

bring death instantly.Adjournment was made at 5 p.m.
and the hearing will be resumed to-

expert. The preliminary hearing
will likely continue Monday. E. B.
