HEAVY RAINS
IN CENTRAL
N. B. TODAY

Today's Was Only Second
Big Rainfall of
Season to Date

River On Rise

Considerable Activity on
River With Pulpwood
on the Drive

Marking only the second big rainfall of the current fall season, Central New Brunswick was shrouded in mist and rain today, the rain following upon several weeks of fine and mild weather.

Actually the season to date has been one of the mildest in several years with only a little cold weather and hardly any rain to speak of. Up until the last few days the river has been at such a low point, due to the lack of rain, that it has been impossible to do any wholesale pulp driving and employees of the Port Royal Pulp and Paper Company have spent weeks "sacking" logs off the dry banks up river.

Increased Activity

Only this week serious activity in pulp driving came about. About 2,000 cords of pulp were floated to the Mitchell boom within the past several days and this already has been towed to Saint John. At least 8,000 cords more will be sent to Saint John within ten days.

Pulpwood operations are being rushed in order to get all the pulp at Saint John before the river freezes over. The weather for almost a month has been unseasonably warm. Some believe this type of weather to be unhealthy and the cause of the epidemic of colds and sore throats which has swept the province in late weeks. While snow fell on Thanksgiving Day in several parts of the province it was practically negligible.

Last year a three-inch snowstorm occurred on November 3—a year ago tomorrow—and on November 11, Remembrance day, one of the worst storms of all the winter season occurred. The storm amounted to a veritable blizzard on that date, with a sub-zero temperature accompanying.

NEW POWER LINE STARTED

Work has been commenced on the new transmission line of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission up to the Southwest Miramichi valley from Newcastle to Doaktown. Three construction crews totalling about one hundred men have commenced to work in groups of thirty or more erecting poles. It is expected that all poles will be placed by December 15 and that the whole system will be operating by Christmas. The provincial government has authorized a grant of \$87,000 for the power line, which is forty seven miles long.

GIFTS APPRECIATED

The children of the Children's Aid Home and the inmates at the Municipal Home received large boxes this week as a result of The Daily Mail's Culinary contest. Bartlett. Rev. Mr. Bartlett will speak on "Music and Worship." Prof. F. W. Harrison will preside at the organ.

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Bus Service To
Be Inaugurated
December 15

W. E. Vaughan, president and manager of the Capital Transit, Limited, announced today that his company applied yesterday to the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer's department for incorporation. The company let the contract yesterday for the construction of three busses of the latest type which are to be ready for service in Fredericton not later than December 15, said Mr. Vaughan. The busses which are equipped to carry twenty passengers each, will, in addition to all modern conveniences, be equipped with radios. The company has not yet drafted their schedule and proposed route but the president stated today that it is their intention to operate from 6 a.m. to one a.m. and given the best possible service to all parts of the city.

Stitches Taken in Head

Bicycle Hurtles into Car
Driven by James Thor-
burn, of Stanley

When his bicycle hurtles into the side of the automobile driven by Jas. Thorburn of Stanley, at six o'clock last evening on Union street, Devon, Phillip McSorley, young son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward McSorley of Devon, received nasty injuries to his head. At the Victoria Hospital later several stitches were taken in the boy's head.

Young McSorley was pedalling at a rapid rate of speed out Union street when the Thorburn car which was proceeding towards him, turned sharply into the driveway at the home of Thomas Griffith on Union street. The boy was unable to stop his bicycle in time to avoid the crash. Dr. Arthur VanWart was called and the boy was taken at once to the hospital for treatment.

No blame has been attached to the driver of the automobile, an investigation of the circumstances having been made by Town Marshall Leo Hayes. Today at the hospital the youth was reported to be improving satisfactorily.
