He pointed out that the drainage done to trees in the severe winter of 1933-'34 would not be fully realized until this summer. At least 30 per cent of the trees in Ontario are showing back splitting this year as a carry over from the winter of 1933-'34. He stressed the seriousness of the damage and advised the New Brunswick growers to watch carefully for damages of this kind and suggested various methods of correcting winter kill.

"From the costly experience of this condition will teach us much about the winter hardness of our apples", stated Mr. Blair. He pointed out to the members the change in hardness of various types of apples.

Mr. Blair reviewed the history of crossing apples in order to obtain hardness with quality. He pointed out that the Dominion Department of Agriculture is experimenting and hope to obtain an apple harder than the Macintosh and equal in quality. This apple, he stated, will be of great commercial value.

A. G. Turney, Provincial Horticulturist and secretary-treasurer of the Association, gave a few remarks on "The Apple Situation in New Brunswick". He pointed out that the Association would strive to have compulsory legislation passed next year in to being about compulsory control and regulation of the maggot situation in New Brunswick. The legislation would entail amendments in the Destructive Insect and Pest Act.

The meeting adjourned to 1:30 this afternoon.
