Network Extended For Black Chamber

NEW YORK, April 12—The Stories of the American Black Chamber and its exciting hunt for spies during and after the World War have proven so popular with the radio audience that the series has been extended until mid-summer and the broadcasts made available to listeners from coast-to-coast.

Based on the experience of Major Herbert O. Yardley, organizer of the Black Chamber, and dramatized for the microphone by D. Thomas Curtin noted radio writer and war correspondent, the Stories of the Black Chamber deal in realistic fashion with spies, secret service operatives, codes, ciphers and wars.

The dramatizations now heard over an NBC-WEAF nationwide network each Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 8.15 p.m., AST., went on the air in the east at the beginning of the year.

Listeners have shown so much interest in "The Spy Exchange," the current story, that the sponsors have extended the network to include the West and Pacific Coast and have arranged to continue the series after the original contract expires.

Capt. Charles O'Neill of Royal 22nd Regt.

Captain Charles O'Neill, who is conducting the band of the Royal 22nd Regiment, one of the foremost military bands in the Dominion, in a series of concerts over the CRBC Eastern network from station CRCK, Quebec, every evening at 7.30 o'clock A. S. T., enjoys an international reputation as a bandmaster.



Widely known as a conductor, composer, adjudicator, lecturer and military bandmaster, Captain O'Neill is a graduate of McGill University and possesses the degree of Muc. Doc. Besides being director of music of the Royal 22nd Regiment of Quebec, he is senior director of Music in the Canadian Army, vice-president of the Dominion College of Music, member of the Canadian College of Organists, and immediate past president of the American Bandmasters' Association.

Captain O'Neill is also a graduate bandmaster of the Royal Military School of Music, Kneeler Hall, London, England. For the past three years he has been lecturer and director of the summer school for bandmasters at the University of Wisconsin, and for six consecutive years he was adjudicator at the United States national band concerts. Mrs. Roosevelt To Discuss White House Entertainments

Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt will describe many of the customs and traditions observed in the White House in giving the ten obligatory social functions each year, in the ninth of her series of weekly broadcasts over the WABC-Columbia network tonight from 9.00 to 9.15 P.M., AST. She will speak on "Official Entertaining in the White House" from the studios of WJSV, Washington.

The ten obligatory functions include five dinners and five formal receptions. The dinners are given for the Cabinet, the Vice-President, the Diplomatic Corps, the Chief Justice and Associates of the Supreme Court, and the Speaker of the House. The formal receptions are given for the Diplomatic Corps, the Judiciary, members of the Congress, the Inter-departmental heads, and the Army and Navy officials.

Among the interesting facts which Mrs. Roosevelt will reveal are:

That invitations to each function are sent out and "must be accepted if the individual is in Washington, and physically able to be present."

That coffee is usually served to the ladies in the Green Room after the formal dinners, while the President and his men guests remain at the table.

That the formal receptions usually last from an hour to an hour and 20 minutes, with from 900 to 1,500 guests in attendance, all of whom shake hands with the President and his wife.

Veronica Wiggins To Be Guest Star

NEW YORK, April 12—Veronica Wiggins, contralto, will be the guest star on Little Miss Bab-O's Musical Surprise Party over an NBC-WEAF network on Sunday, April 14 at 2.30 p.m., AST.

In addition to Miss Wiggins, who has made numerous recordings and has appeared on many radio programs, the Bab-O trio, the Bab-O Choristers and an orchestra under the direction of Bertrand Hirsch will be heard.
