Bulletin talks of fishing in Florida and its need for organization. After reading the following discourse, some of our tourist and fish-loving officials might find a hint or two of how to organize similarly in this province. This might be especially applicable to the new committee of laying emphasis on the fishing resources of the province in its new campaign for publicity and tourist trade. Peterman's advice is contained in the following:

"To promote a fishing trip, and make sure of getting fish, requires a trip to the beach, a prowl among fishing haunts there, a dickering and bargaining for boat and guides and then hagling over bait and fishing tackle. In the end it will cost about \$35 to get ten persons out by 9.30 a.m. necessitating a rise at 6.30 and early breakfast, with the trip lasting till evening. This is considered a reasonable excursion today. if you have the money and the time to search out a man with equipment, you can go.

But there are hundreds of potential fishermen who don't have friends with whom to form a fishing party, and who don't have the time to hunt for a guide. These lads in a place like Ft. Myers are licked. There is no clearing house from which the lore and lure of surrounding game waters may be dis-

The crying need of the fishing in Florida is organization. Perhaps some day a smart group of opportunists will move in and make the local talent wish it had leaped into action, but the lack still exists from year to year. Fishing, grandest natural sport the Peninsula has to offer, remains hit and miss from start to finish.

The moneyed sportsman who owns his cruiser or fishing craft, can put in and out as he pleases, trusting to luck and good navigation to keep him in the channels and off the shoals. But the guy who goes out only once or twice and doesn't bring a load of equipment along, is in a bad way to get going.

Florida, and especially towns like Ft. Myers needs somebody to establish booking agents for fishermen. places to date up guides, boats and the sportsmen without their having to ferret each other. It needs upto-date sporting stores which make this part of their service hotels which take care of guests in like manner. At present it's all left to the individual, and where the local Chamber of Commerce will take \$12 from a fishing guide and promise to send him clients, not a line of information is put out in the town, and mightly little advertising beond. One fishing guide said he paid this sum and hasn't had a party come nis way yet, although dozens go thaily rambling around trying to find a man with a boat.

Another item which until this year bothered the fishing gentry, was the itinerant angler who fished for market. The fellow, probably a motor camper spending an idle season in the South and using a tourist centre or empty ground as a home, caught oodles of fish and glutted the market, thus making enough

The reason was a new licensing law, forbidding the sale of fish commercially except by payment of a \$30 fee and membership in a fishing union.

Of course this may be circumvented; the sportsman can "give" his catch to the guide, who, being an NRA fisherman, sells it at eight cents a pound to the market. He can kick back what he chooses to his friend, or if smart will knock the proceeds off the cost of bait and tackle to his guests.
