Organized March, 1916.
Motto, "The will to do and the will to dare."

The name "Anagwakade" was given by the Passamaquoddy Indians to one of the first American Settlements and means "White Man's Land of Plenty."

The first Regent of the Chapter was Mrs. Mac O'Brien (nee Miss Rita Barry) of Nelson, N.B., who was succeeded, in the order given, by Miss Louise Sterling, Miss Bertha Harvey, Mrs. E. C. Armstrong, Miss Annette Montgomery-Campbell, Miss Bertha Harvey, Miss Jean Hodge and Mrs. D. W. Griffiths.

In the past the activities of Anagwakade have been very much the same as the average Chapter that was in existence during the war, its war work including assistance to the victims of the Halifax Disaster in 1917. For the year of 1934-35, the principal efforts of this Chapter are being directed toward the Endowment Fund, Empire Work in India and Educational Work.

Anagwakade takes this opportunity—the New Year for every Primary Chapter of the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire—to wish them a very prosperous "I.O.D.E. Year" and good luck in all their endeavors.

Passamaquoddy, St. Andrews

Motto: "Not for Ourselves Alone."
In 1918, chiefly through the efforts of Mrs. E. A. Smith, the Passamaquoddy Chapter of the I.O.D.E. was founded in St. Andrews and Mrs. Smith named as our 1st Hon. Regent. The name Passamaquoddy is an old Indian name, meaning "Little Flower" and bringing to our minds the beautiful bay near us.

We had the honor of entertaining Lady Willingdon at luncheon in our Tearoom when the Vice-Regal party visited St. Andrews. It is also a means of securing funds for the use of our many activities, as we have a tea room there in the summer months.

We have presented libraries to country schools, framed pictures of the war to our local school, placed the names on the local streets, supplied free milk to school children during the winter months, contributed to the Navy League, work in India, to the Endowment Fund, relief of British Settlers, to our district nurse's salary, and brought Christmas cheer into the homes of many at Christmas time. Ours is just a small Chapter, with each member having many calls on her for various other things, and we have truly tried to live up to our motto: "Not for ourselves alone." We have only had three Regents Miss Freda Wren (who is now Mrs. Geo. Bishop), Mrs. J. M. Hare, and Mrs. Wm. J. Rollins

We assisted in providing and furnishing soldiers' clubs.

Bliss Carman Chapter, Fredericton

Through the efforts of Mrs. A. T. McMurray, the Provincial President of the I.O.D.E., the Bliss Carman Memorial Chapter was organized on March 18, 1933. This Chapter feels proud to have been able to choose for its name the name of our beloved Canadian poet, Bliss Carman.

Our motto is "We Also Serve."

The Regent is Miss Margaret Scott. Although recently organized, the Bliss Carman Memorial Chapter has been an active one. British pictures have been sponsored, aid given to the families of returned men, to the City Welfare Bureau, and the Dental Survey of the City.

Donations have been made to the Endowment Fund of the Order; Empire Work in India; V. O. N. Nurse Board; the Children's Aid; Navy League; and Miss Estabrook for her work among new settlers.

The Chapter has joined with the other City Chapters in placing a wreath on the Cenotaph; and donating to the Loyalist Monument, also in entertaining the party of English school boys who visited Fredericton on their tour of Canada.

Libraries have been placed in country schools on Empire Day, and a course of Empire Study planned.

Our Standard was presented through the generosity of the Fundy Chapter, of Saint John.

Malabeam Chapter In Hartland

Organized Oct. 8th, 1924, at Hartland, N. B.

Motto: "Non solum nobis."

Regents since organization: Mrs. S. S. Miller, Mrs. H. H. Hatfield, Miss L. M. Reid

When the Chapter was organized the National War Memorial was nearing its completion, and a large proportion of our earnings were given to this national undertaking.

The work of the Chapter has been largely educational. Every year prizes are given in the schools, and ten libraries have been placed in schools in Hartland and nearby places. A series of addresses of educational value have been arranged by the Chapter, and we have contributed to the League of Nations, Seamen's Mission, Girl Guides, Red Cross, Navy League, Institute for the Blind at Halifax, and the Order's splendid Work in India. The Chapter helped the G.W.V.A. to erect their monument, and sent Christmas boxes to British settlers' families for some years.

One of the very practical efforts of the Chapter was in assisting young girls to get their hospital training. To one of them we gave five dollars per week for three months and to the other a generous sum was given for her outfit.

The much prized standard of the Chapter was the gift of Mrs. H. H. Hatfield, who was Regent for some years.

Barrington Memorial, Edmundston

The Barrington Memorial Chapter, Edmundston, was organized officially on Oct. 17, 1929. Mrs. H. F. McLeod, of Fredericton occupied the chair on this occasion.

The Chapter was named after Mrs. Sybella Barrington as a tribute to her faithful work in all charities, especially Red Cross and I.O.D.E.

Our motto: "Service."

Regents since organization: Mrs. C. M. Rideout, Mrs. J. Reeth, Mrs. R. V. McCabe.

Special work of Chapter each year: Providing milk or hot lunches for local school children during winter months; also cod liver oil and medicine. Two history prizes each year for Grades 8 and 11. Members attend Empire Day exercises. We assist local families of returned soldiers with milk, food and clothing. We have provided Libraries for three country schools.

We assist the V.O.N. Association by helping to furnish aprons and contributions, also Public Health Nurse by helping to furnish office. We also assist local hospital, have I.O.D.E. room furnished by this Chapter. We keep same supplied with linen and have a jam, jelly and pickle shower once a year. Flags have been supplied by this Chapter to each room in the schools here. Oratorical contests organized in English and French sponsored by I.O.D.E. March 25th, 1933. We also paid fee of two out-of-town soldiers' children to attend school in Edmundston.

The Earl of Dalhousie Chapter

The Earl of Dalhousie Chapter was organized Nov. 2nd 1932, by the Provincial Organizer, Mrs. A. T. McMurray, and Mrs. A. I. Morrison, Organizing Secretary.

The Motto selected: "For God, For King and Empire."

Mrs. L. J. Ruet was Regent for 1932, succeeded by Mrs. W. S. Montgomery for 1933. We have a membership of 57.

Since organization the money raised was expended in the following manner: Donations to Work in India, Anderson Road School, Stewart Endowment Fund, History Prizes in Convent and Public Schools, Child Welfare Work.

An ambitious piece of work undertaken by the Chapter was erection of a Cairn on the Court House Grounds, to the memory of the soldiers who made the supreme sacrifice. The unveiling took place on August 22nd, the day being proclaimed a half holiday by Mayor Allain. The unveiling was done by Mrs. W. S. Montgomery, the Regent of the Chapter.

A beautiful bronze Tablet on the Cairn bears the following inscription: "Erected by the Earl of Dalhousie Chapter I.O.D.E., in commemoration of those belonging to the County of Restigouche, who made the supreme sacrifice in the service of their country in the Great War, 1914-1918."

After the unveiling many beautiful wreaths and sprays were laid at the foot of the Cairn, followed by the sounding of the Last Post.

During the war ambulances, motor trucks, machine guns, field kitchens, and automobiles were donated.

Looking Ahead to New Conquests

The Daughters of the Empire have sometimes been accused of complacency—of pluming themselves on their services during the Great War, on their War Memorial and on their other accomplishments. While they have every reason to be proud of their efforts in the past, it is important for them to remember the exhortation of Saint Paul—"to forget the things that are behind and to reach forth to the things that are before."

Royal Standard Chapter, Saint John

Motto: "Not For One But For All."

The Royal Standard Chapter was formed January 5th, 1915, by Miss Travers was Secretary and Mrs. H. A. ladies to join. Mrs. E. Atherton Smith was elected the first Regent, and while in office during the five years of her Regency, Feb. 1915 to Feb. 1920, through the efforts of the Regent and her thirty-five members, the Chapter raised \$63,206.86. Miss Travers was Secretary and Mrs. H. A. McKeown the Treasurer.

The largest donations made by the Chapter were as follows:

Belgium Relief, \$12,866.94.
Patriotic Fund, \$12,589.97.
Overseas Hospital, \$2,849.50.

Donations were given to the regimental fund of the 26th Battalion and dinners to the battalion amounting to 2,476.75. Colors were given the 26th Battalion costing \$404.37. Band instruments for the 55th and 64th Battalions. Trumpets for the 115th Batt., Gramophones, Bag Pipes for the 256 McLean Kilites the fund of \$4,300 collected by our Regent. To the Nacy \$2,653. Blind Soldiers \$1,000.54. Soldiers' Comforts \$859.86. Local Red Cross \$700.00. Historical Memorial Museum at Ottawa \$800.26. Furnishing East Saint John Hospital Recreation Room \$624.72. Seamen's Institute, Saint John \$600.00. This is a short resume of our work during the War. The amount of money raised during the three and one half years amounted to \$63,206.86 under the splendid generalship of our Regent, Mrs. E. Atherton Smith and the great assistance and support given her by the 30 members of the Chapter. The scope of the activities of the Chapter has been greatly curtailed since the end of the war, but we still try to follow our motto, "Not For One But For All" and the following are some of our endeavors.

For the last few years we have concentrated on the work in India, Educational Work and Endowment Fund.

Royal Chapter, Sussex

Royal Chapter was organized on Friday, November 23rd, 1928, with an enrolment of fifteen members. Present at this meeting were Mrs. H. F. McLeod, of Fredericton, Provincial President, who explained the aims and purposes of the Order, and Mrs. Purdy, of Moncton, Provincial Organizer, who assisted in getting our Chapter under way.

The first Regent of the Chapter was Mrs. Gordon McKay, who served in this office for three years, and was succeeded by Mrs. Ora P. King, the present incumbent.


The name "Royal" was selected by ballot and the motto "Semper Paratus" chosen.

Very early in its career, Royal Chapter identified itself with Relief activities, as well as Educational Work, and although Christmas came within one month of organization, several large and well-filled boxes were sent to settlers in the vicinity.

Our funds have been expended largely on Educational Work, Child Welfare and Relief.

The contributions to Child Welfare have consisted of holding dental clinics and distributing milk to the school.

Valcartier Chapter, Saint John

Organized September 1914.
Motto: "Courage is the Source of Patriotism."

Valcartier Chapter was organized in September, 1914, and named for the Valcartier Camp, at which the Canadians were in training for Overseas Service in the Great War. This suggested for our Motto: "Courage is the Source of Patriotism." The first Regent was Miss Rosamond McAvity.

Considerable money was raised during the war years, enabling us to give generously to the support of war-time funds, including foreign donations to the Cleydon Hospital, Lady Rose Ambulance Society, Dr. Murray McLaren's Stationary Hospital at Etaples, Florence Hospital, Y.M.C.A. Prisoners of War Fund, British Red Cross, Nursing Sister Barnhill in France, and the V.A.D.

Locally we gave to G.W.V.A., Military Hospital, West Saint John, Soldiers' Club, Military Y.M.C.A., Red Triangle Club, Blue Cross and Seamen's Mission.

The War over, we devoted more of our efforts to local affairs.

We became a corporate Member of the League of Nations Society aided financially in a Boys' Scout Drive and gave a sum of money to the School for the Blind.

Child Welfare Work became one of our chief interests. Many children were clothed and families supplied with food.

In 1925 the Lady Roberts Chapter amalgamated with the Valcartier Chapter.

The sum of \$5,600,000 was raised for war purposes.

Sir Howard Douglas Chapter, Fredericton

Organized by Mrs. John Black, October 1910.

Motto: "One Flag, One Land, One Heart, One Hand, One Nation Evermore."

This Chapter was named in honour of Sir Howard Douglas, second Governor of New Brunswick, founder of King's College (The University of New Brunswick) and one to whom our City and Province owes much.

Our standard was a gift from the Hon. Capt. and Mrs. Ashburnham (now the late Earl) and the Countess of Ashburnham).

In 1926 we had the honour of inaugurating the beautiful ceremony held at the Cenotaph on Armistice Day, and have planned the service each year since until taken over two years ago by the B.E.S.L.

During the War our work was carried on through the central committee, and generous support given.

Educational work has been one of the chief activities of the Chapter. Money has been given and loaned to students to enable them to complete their university courses.

The chapter has loyally supported all the activities of the National Chapter besides supporting such local causes as the V.O.N., Child Welfare Bureau, Free Milk Fund.

Work in India has received generous support and appeals of returned men and their families have received liberal assistance.

The name 'Lord Beaverbrook' given the Chapter was in honour of a boy of our Town, Max Aitken, son of the Rev. Wm. Aitken, Presbyterian Minister in Newcastle, has been honored by the title Lord Beaverbrook.

Though our average membership has been under 20, since organization the Chapter has raised over \$11,000.00 as follows: War Memorial, \$700.00; Nurses' Home Fund, \$2003.74; equipment Nurses' Home, \$604.28; toward X-ray at Miramichi Hospital, \$50.00; Milk Fund, \$1,834.50; Victorian Order Nurses, \$2905.00; School Prizes and Libraries, \$503.82; Navy League \$50; Work in India, \$29.00; Christmas cheer to new settlers and charity in town, \$657.95; sent to Provincial Chapter for Appeals, \$147.65; Girls' Provincial Home, Moncton, \$125.00; fees to Provincial Chapter, \$402.55; expenses to raise these amounts, \$1,000.00.

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
