

### Brunswick Chapter, West Saint John

Brunswick Chapter, I.O.D.E., West Saint John, was organized November 5th, 1913, taking as its motto: "Im-mota Fides, nec aspera terrant," "Un-wavering Faith, no Perils terrify."

The list of Regents includes the fol-lowing: 1913-18, Mrs. J. Boyle Travers; 1918-20, Mrs. W. I. Fenton; 1920-21, Mrs. G. S. Mayes; 1921-22, Mrs. W. I. Fenton; 1922-25, Mrs. H. W. Wetmore; 1925-27, Mrs. J. W. Hart; 1927-28, Mrs. S. H. Mayes; 1929-31, Mrs. W. B. Earle; 1931, 34, Mrs. F. S. Tilton; 1934, Mrs. John B. M. Baxter.

This Chapter, the second to be or-ganized in Saint John, has carried on faithfully the work expected of it, ever holding before it the motto of the National Chapter, "One Flag, One Throne, One Empire" as its in-spiration.

An event of great interest was the presentation of a flag to the "Winter Port of Canada" and placing same on No. 6 Shed Extension, West Saint John, N. B., on March 13th, 1914.

Outstanding activities during the period of the Great War 1914-1918

were as follows: The members made a canvass of west side residents and the money raised was given to "The Queen Mary Hospital Ship." Soldiers' comforts were furnished including

2550 pairs of socks, wristlets, hel-mets, etc.; donations of money were given to the Patriotic Fund, the Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem; flags were pre-sented to the 115th Battalion which were afterwards placed in Trinity Church, St. John, N.B. on Warriors' Day, March 31st, 1921; the sum of \$1,628.16 was collected for band in-struments for the 140th Battalion; the sum of \$1,036.00 was collected for comforts for the Siberian contingent to be used for the men after their ar-rival in Siberia; the sum of \$2,695.25 was collected for Dr. Murray MacLar-en's use for the New Brunswick ward of the Canadian Hospital in France; a ward was furnished in the Saint John Hospital on St. James St., and many comforts were sent the soldier patients; a ward of fourteen beds was furnished in the Lancaster Military Hospital.

An appeal from an ex-service man is always answered. These appeals are met by our "Lest we forget fund."

Empire Study has become a very important factor in the work of the Chapter. The League of Nations has been faithfully supported.

Work in India is one of our obli-gations. Papers have been read and money has been given each year since 1924 to further the educational work begun by the late Miss Susie Sorabji.

#### A NEW CHAPTER

A new Chapter has been recently formed in Sackville by a group of young women who were formerly al-lied in a study club. There are 35 members and the name of the Chap-ter will be announced later.

### Royal Arms Chapter, Saint John

The Royal Arms Chapter was or-ganized on November 28th, 1918, with Mrs. T. H. Carter as Regent. Our motto is "Carry On." Past regents are Mrs. Carter, Mrs. Wigmore, Mrs. Nor-man Gregory, Mrs. Wm. Turner. The present regent is Mrs. McAlpine.

We have raised money for the War Memorial, Soldiers' Monument in Fernhill Cemetery, stones on graves, where we have placed on each a wreath of green and poppies, on Armistice Day. This duty was taken over two years ago by the Canadian Le-gion.

The Chapter gives four prizes for History each year, gives to Child Welfare, Red Cross, Fresh-air Camps, Seaman's Mission and sends games and magazines to the Airport.

We pay our share towards the salary of the teacher at the County Hos-pital and salary of V. O. Nurse. Help has been given to Soldiers' families, and at Christmas boxes sent to re-turned men at the County Hospital.

### Fort Cumberland Chapter, Moncton

Motto: "One and All"

Fort Cumberland Chapter, which derived its name from the old Fort lying thirty five miles from Moncton near the Nova Scotia border, was organized in October 1910, by Miss Catherine Merritt and was one of the first Chapters in New Brunswick. The membership has increased from 18 to 88 at the present time.

During the days of the Great War the Chapter opened "Queen Mary" Tea Room and was thereby enabled to give generously to patriotic funds also a Work Room where the members worked zealously sending boxes and bales of clothing and comforts to the soldiers.

The Chapter has also endowed a Room in the new City Hospital.

The I.O.D.E. has assisted towards Local War Memorials.

### Victor Hatheway, Fredericton

The Victor Hatheway Chapter, Im-perial Order Daughters of the Em-pire, Fredericton, was organized Feb-ruary 8th, 1915. The organization meeting was held at the residence of the late Mrs. G. C. VanWart and was attended by ten High School girls. The Chapter bears the name of a Frederic-ton boy, Midshipman Victor Hathe-way, who lost his life in the early part of the Great War in a naval battle off the coast of Chile when His Majesty's Ship "Good Hope" went down Novem-ber 1st, 1914. The motto which was chosen at this meeting is "We break before we bend."

During the War, the Chapter co-op-erated with a local central committee, which was organized for War Relief and composed of the different Socie-ties in the city. After the war the work was extended and greater interest was taken in welfare work, particularly in the welfare of returned soldiers and their families and in educational work.

The Chapter contributes annually to the Children's Aid Society, Frederic-ton, the Victorian Order of Nurses, Fredericton and the Central Welfare. Donations are sent Miss Estabrooks M.B.E., for her work among British Settlers; to the Seamen's Mission, St. John, and a corporate membership is usually taken in "Interdependence," the official organ of the League of Nations in Canada, and the publica-tions are sent to various institutions. The Chapter also supports the Na-tional Endowment Fund, Empire Work in India, and the Navy League.

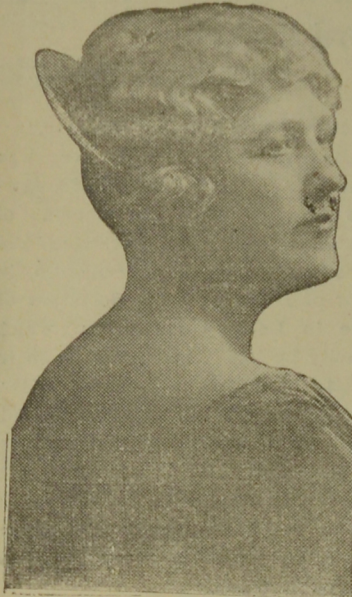
