He Played Horn For Liszt Baton

CINCINNATI, Ohio, March 9 -Members of the Armco Concert Band recently staged a celebration in honor of the 73rd birthday of Carl Kohlman, oldest member of the band and believed to be the only living musician in America who played under the baton of the great Franz Liszt.

Kohlman, who plays the bass horn in the regular Sunday evening concerts of the Armco band over an NBC-WEAF network at 7.30 p.m., A. S. T., remembers vividly the first concert he played for Liszt in Berlin in 1874. A great orchestra had been assembled to play at a concert which was attended by the Emperors of Germany, Russia and Austria. Kohlman, then a youth of sixteen years, was so inspired by the occasion that he determined upon., a musical career... Since then he has played under the outstanding conductors of Europe and America.. He has been a member of the Armco band since its organization.


