July 4th Celebration At Washington Will Be Heard on Radio

The colorful Fourth of July celebration held annually in Washington, D. C., on the north slope of the Washington monument grounds, will be heard and described in a special broadcast over WABC and the Columbia network from 9:00 to 9:30 P. M., A. S. T. tonight.

The celebration is staged each year as a civic project, arranged by the commissioners of the District of Columbia and by prominent businessmen of the nation's capital. It is being broadcast by Columbia as symbolic of similar community celebrations, which will be held throughout the nation.

The principal address will be delivered by Senator Harry F. Byrd of Virginia. Col. Edwin A. Halsey, secretary of the United States Senate, will read the Declaration of Independence. Music will be provided by the United States Marine band, and by the drum and bugle corps of Costello Post of the American Legion.

A colorful feature of the celebration to be described by a CBS announcer, will be the "procession of the flags."

"Nothing But the Truth" To Feature Curious Facts

Featuring many odd facts and curious items usually overlooked by most Independence Day speakers, Alexander McQueen will present in his "Nothing But the Truth" program some unfamiliar highlights of history during his Fourth of July over the WBBM-Columbia network tonight, from 7:15 to 7:30 P. M., A. S. T. McQueen's unusual fund of information will reveal why it took five years to secure all the signatures on the original Declaration of Independence and will include many other details of human interest.

McQueen who presents his parades of amazing facts before the microphone in his "Nothing But the Truth" programs, says he really started his collection of odd truths at the advanced age of seven when he underlined the existing incidents in a second-hand history of Rome which he had purchased for a few cents. Today his fund of information is gathered into a huge library including some two hundred dictionaries and an imposing row of filing cabinets.

Born in Colchester, England on February 7, 1886, McQueen was reared and educated there. Before coming to America at the age of 18, he appeared in several Shakespearean plays with a London company of which Lionel Atwill was a member. In America he turned a magazine and newspaper work, writing "strange facts" columns in Chicago and later in Cincinnati. In the latter city he was actively associated for many years with the Little Theatre movement, having
