The Total Deficit for the Fiscal Year Ended Oct. 31st. Was \$876,551.69-This is Made Public Today in a Statement By the Comptroller-General of New Bruns-N. B. Electric Power Commission General of New Brunswick, W. A. Loudoun.

A deficit of \$876,551.69 was incur red during the fiscal year by the Province of New Brunswick which year closed October 31st and the total net debt is shown as \$48,411,380.49. The usual statement of the finances of the Province was made public today through the Comptroller General's de martment.

The figures are as published herewith today.
