

CITY ESTIMATES BY COUNCIL AT MARCH MEETING

Indication Roads-Street
Dept. Appropriations
To Be Increased

To Build New Street

Council to Hold Most
Important Meeting of
Year on Monday

The City Council will hold its March committee meeting on Monday evening at which time the estimates for the ensuing year will be discussed and decided upon. The meeting is the most important one of the entire year since the expenditures in the various city departments is decided and on this basis rests the tax rate to be charged against the citizens for the year.

His Worship Mayor Clark said this morning that he could not estimate yet whether the appropriations or tax rate would be larger this year than last. Total appropriations in all departments last year was \$265,000 and the tax rate was 2.76.

Increased Estimates

Mayor Clark points out that there is likely to be increased appropriation for the Roads and Streets Department. This will be necessary due to the proposed building of a new street, to be called Beaverbrook street, from Regent street to University Avenue. Besides this there is much permanent work to be done during the coming summer.

It is possible that appropriations of the School Board will be slightly reduced for the coming year though this will be threshed out at Monday's committee meeting. This will be a chance for several of the Aldermen who have been talking in private about the School Board to come out and show where they stand. All other departments are liable to be pared down in order to keep the tax rate from rising.

GOV. MACLAREN AIDS IN CANCER FUND CAMPAIGN

Discusses 66-Day Drive
For National Cancer
Relief Fund

Radio Addresses

All Canada To Raise
Funds To Combat the
Dread Disease

In connection with the Dominion wide campaign to raise money for a national cancer relief fund to commemorate the 25th anniversary of King George's accession to the throne, His Honor Lieutenant Governor Murray MacLaren is taking an active interest and participation.

To a reporter of The Daily Mail His Honor outlined the purposes of the campaign, which is to raise a fund for efforts in dealing with cancer in the Dominion of Canada. His Honor at his office this week outlined the aims and objects of the campaign.

Over a coast-to-coast network of the Canadian Radio Broadcasting Commission last night the Earl of Bessborough inaugurated the Campaign for the King George V Silver Jubilee Cancer Fund for Canada by asking that every household in the Dominion send \$1 or more to Lady Bessborough who has undertaken to receive and acknowledge all contributions which will be turned over for administration to a seven-member board of trustees. The campaign will close May 6, Silver Jubilee of His Majesty's accession.

In his speech the Governor General recalled that in 1926 a total of 7,614 persons died in Canada of cancer, and that the figure had risen by 1933 to 10,646 deaths.

"It is essential," he declared, "that there should be some central source of assistance in this cause. Therefore it has been decided that the Silver Jubilee of His Majesty can be permanently commemorated in no more fitting manner, in no manner that would confer a greater benefit than by the creation of a permanent anti-cancer fund."

Prime Minister Bennett's speech told of the nation-wide audience it was asked to contribute to the fund. Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, the prime minister, also spoke.

He said that the twenty-five years that had passed since His Majesty was called upon to accept the great responsibilities of King Emperor have witnessed changes of a magnitude and consequence never before recorded in the history of the world. Human life has been sacrificed on a scale before unknown. Dynasties have fallen. Old institutions have perished. New nations have arisen. New forms of government have been established. Man has passed through a death struggle with those instruments and inventions which he had every reason to believe would be ministering to his necessities and comforts. Rapidity of communication has made the exchange of opinions between nations a matter of minutes. But amid all these manifestations of change, the British Empire has survived and continues to exercise an influence upon world thought and conditions as great if not greater than at any time in its history.

I am certain, the premier said, that historians of the future will attribute that fact in no small degree to the wisdom, sagacity and influence of the life and personality of His Majesty the King. The keynote of his reign is found in the words in which he thanked the people of his Empire for their sympathy on the death of his illustrious father, Edward VII. He said he undertook his duties "strong in my faith in God, thanking my people, and cherishing the law and constitution of (Continued on Page Five)

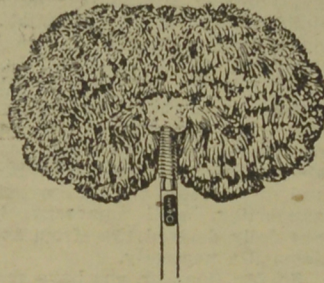

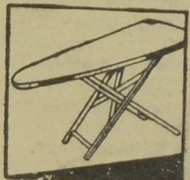

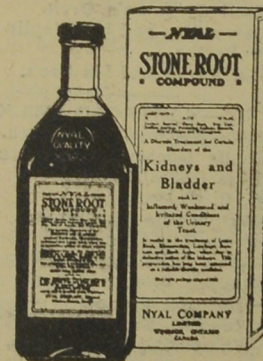
