Wheelers To Have A Youthful Team

Jimmy Riddell announces the start of training for turf pounders, and that doesn't mean only the boys who have been tuning up on the fairways. The boss of the Wheelers has been on the move for some days now with his first Lieutenant Clarry Foran, and the inseparable pair are gradually eliminating sundry problems which face them this year.

There is a nine-game schedule to consider, necessitating earlier conditioning work and a sound squad for the start.

There are players to be replaced, younger men to be trained for their positions, and in this connection it is lamentable, but well to remember that

Wheelers will not have that old standby Huckleberry Welch to rely on with his booming punts in the campaign lying directly ahead.

The Wheelers will again play their games at the McGill gridiron. They will have their training there, and several workouts will doubtless be arranged against the Redmen, who will be guided by Joe O'Brien.

Wheelers hope to send a well-balanced and youthful team out in the red and blue cardigans this Fall. The make-up of the squad is more or less in the air as yet, for it is not known at the moment of writing which of the veteran grid men will return, which have decided to leave the togs on the peg.

Welch has departed and the backfield will have to be recast to fill the gap. Carl Palombo, the big fellow from Penn. is still close at hand and will definitely be back for duty on the line. Lew Newton will be a fixture at centre, and Bill Pendergast will return to show what he really can do on the backfield.

Nothing But Ill Luck

Pendergast had nothing but ill luck last season on his first Canadian football venture, but Foran has confidence in the former New York University star and he will be accorded another chance to show something he has asked for. He encountered a steady run of injuries last fall, the most serious forcing him from the fray at Ottawa.

DOMINION WOMEN'S TRACK MEET DRAWS BIG ENTRY

Miss Eileen Meagher To Represent Maritimes

Beauty, speed and strength to the number of one hundred and fifty they will be invading this city this week in the persons of many track and field athletes who seek the women's Dominion track and field championship honors.

They are coming from coast to coast, these dark haired, blonde and auburn topped girls of the great outdoor game. They represent the cream of each Provincial crop, champions in their own right of home territories.

These Canadian championships which have attracted a Dominion-wide entry and attention will take place at the M.M.A.A.A. Grounds next Saturday afternoon. They are being held under the auspices of the Quebec Branch of the Women's Amateur Athletic Federation of Canada. The games will be in the nature of preliminary Olympic trials as well as to determine the 1935 Dominion title holders.

Her Excellency the Countess of Beesborough has graciously extended her patronage to this Canadian championship meet.

The games will open with the parade of competing athletes and officials. The salute will be taken by His Worship Mayor Houde.

The honor of heading the parade has fallen to one of Canada's outstanding Olympic Games competitors, Miss Eva Dawes of Toronto. Her club, Toronto Women's A. C., is the oldest women's track club in the Dominion so it will be the orange and black colors which will lead the parade of attractive young ladies past the saluting base.

Challenging from the west will be a band of eight Manitoba girls, all specialists in their particular events. Heading their entries will be Evelyn Goshawk, considered one of the best running broad jumpers in the country and who represented Canada at the British Empire Games last summer.

Irene Grinke, winner of the intermediate Canada 60 and 100 metres last year has moved into senior ranks. Her intermediate titles will be undefended. Winnipeg's new sprint sensation Violet Montgomery, Manitoba 100 and 200 metre champion, is also making the trip. Robina Higgins who set two new Canadian records at the discus and javelin throw recently will be on hand. She is also seeking the shot put honors. Florence Merriman, the Manitoba, junior high jump champion is coming; also Helen Rose, senior high jump champion who has a jump of 5 feet 3/4 inches to her credit.

She is also an expert hurdler and broad jumper. Ruby Palmer, intermediate 60 and 100 metres Manitoba champion, and Mary Pitts, runner up to Miss Palmer in the sprints, are also in the party.

The Maritime challenge comes in the form of Miss Eileen Meagher, Canadian record holder for the 200 metres. Mrs. W. E. Stirling, President of the W.A.A.F. of C. will accompany Miss Meagher and other Halifax entries to Montreal.

NEW GROUP FOR BRAVES

BOSTON, Aug. 7.—George Preston Marshall, 38-year-old Washington laundry magnate, yesterday arranged to take over the operation of the Boston Braves for Charles Francis Adams and associates, the present owners.

Conferring all day, they agreed to an intricate financial setup under which the Marshall group would constitute a "Braves management operation corporation," while ownership continued to rest with Adams and the present minority stockholders.

President Ford Frick of the National League is understood to have okayed the plan by telephone. The last obstacle, which may be smoothed out within a few days, is approval by the First National Bank of Boston from which the Braves borrowed heavily under the regime of ex-president Emil Fuchs.

Under the tentative plan the Marshall group would run the Braves, putting in as much rebuilding capital as they cared.

Meantime, Adams and associates would be guaranteed the present value of the 14,300 shares of stock, no more, no less.

Marshall could buy them out at that agreed valuation, under an option which would probably run for five years. Or, on expiration of the option the present owners might pool their holdings into a new corporation with the Marshall group.
