Most people in better circumstance could learn much from them. Anybody can go with one of these fellows and know he has at his side a partner who will be with him at the finish."

ed; you had to make good, or seek the nearest exit. And he made good, as others of the pioneer band of the early nineties made good. When asked by some one or other of the junior workers what the chances were in the business for accumulating money, Van would invariably reply: "If you mean, am I a rich man—I am not".

In his early days, though small in physical stature, and not always in robust health, Van Buren had a consuming desire to become an athlete. And to his credit and typical of the determination that was part of him, he practiced so diligently that he succeeded in mastering the difficult trick of long and high jumping, much, as he declared, to his own surprise. He was a member of many societies, and one he thought proudly of was "The Silurians", that famed organization of newspaper men, whose right to membership rests on thirty years' service on the newspapers in the city of New York. Two other New Brunswickers are members of this society, James E. Dever, and the present writer.

Dr. Thorne's great-great-grandfather, Melancthon Thorne, the ancestor, who landed at Saint John in 1783, one

of the 35,000 Loyalists who emigrated to Canada in the days of the Revolution, owned at one time the greater part of what is now Glen Cove, Long Island, where the million dollar estates of the Mackays and the Pratts spread out to bedazzle the eyes of wayfarers in automobiles, of whom sometimes Van Buren Thorne was one. When he was in the mood, this modest newspaper man could stand laughingly on a hill-top and expatiate on all the wealth that might perhaps have been his had not his honored progenitor preferred free conscience and loyalty to mere wealth of lands and mills.

Dr. Van Buren Thorne was one of the most kindly of men. He gave freely and without price what he had learned in the school of medicine and at the bedside of the sick. He had the vast pleasure of high accomplishment in three great professions—medicine, journalism and teaching, each of which brought him into close touch with humanity.
