

## REMAINS OF ACCIDENT VICTIM ARE SENT HOME

Body of W. Netzsche  
Killed in Motorcycle  
Accident, Here

Died of Broken Neck

Frederick C. Johnston,  
Vice-Consul, Looks Af-  
ter Arrangements

The remains of Walter Netzsche, 35 year old motorcyclist of Palisade, N. J., who met a violent death by broken neck when he was catapulted from his motorcycle while approaching Pokiook on Wednesday evening, will be sent to Medford, Mass., on to-night's train, according to Frederick C. Johnston, American Vice-Consul. Mr. Johnston is looking after all arrangements, and has been in touch with relatives of the dead man, and has taken over his personal effects. The body is lying at a local undertaking establishment today.

The body will be sent to a brother, Eric Netzsche living at Medford, Mass. Fred Wohlgemuth of Valley-stream, N. Y., who was a fellow motorcyclist, will accompany Netzsche's body to Boston this evening.

Netzsche died at the Victoria Hospital early yesterday morning from a broken neck received when he was thrown from his motorcycle, a distance of about fifty-one feet.

According to investigation Netz-sche's motorcycle failed to clear an irregularity in the road and the machine hurtled some 50 feet. It is indicated, Coroner Dr. Charles Mac-Kay said, that the driver landed on his head, and was thrown fifteen feet farther. An inquest was decided to be unnecessary.

## BEATTY PARTY ARRIVE HERE THIS AFTERNOON

To Be Informally Re-  
ceived by City, Board  
of Trade, Cabinet

Arrive at 4.40 p.m.

Premier Dysart Will  
Tender Welcome in  
Assembly Chamber

Travelling by special train of three official cars, Sir Edward W. Beatty, chairman and president of the Canadian Pacific Railways, and party, are expected to arrive at Union Station at 4.40 o'clock this afternoon, Daylight Saving Time, and will remain here for two hours. The special will arrive from Saint John.

Premier A. A. Dysart and his cabinet, His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark and members of the city Council, and also members of the Board of Trade will gather in the Legislative Assembly chamber at 5.20 o'clock and Sir Edward and his party will be informally received. The special train carrying the party of C. P. R. officials will leave here for St. Andrews later in the evening.

Canadian Pacific directors who will arrive with Sir Edward are Sir Charles Gordon, G.B.E., president of the Bank of Montreal; Ross H. McMaster, president and director of the Steel Company of Canada, Ltd., and Morris W. Wilson, president of the Royal Bank of Canada. Senator Smeaton White is also with the party, as is H. J. Humphrey, vice-president and general manager of the C. P. R. eastern lines; J. Harry Smith, director of the Canadian Pacific Press Bureau, and T. C. Macnabb, general superintendent of the New Brunswick district, Canadian Pacific, who joined Sir Edward at Digby.

## S. S. Miller's Name Mentioned Liberal Candidate

It is rumored about the city today that S. S. Miller, vice-president of the Board of Trade, and member of a wholesale drug company doing business in this city, has been approached by a number of Liberals and has been asked to have his name go before the convention to be held this week, as a Liberal candidate in York-Sunbury. When called up in regard to the matter Mr. Miller had nothing to say other than to intimate that some persons had been speaking to him. He stated, however, that the matter of selecting a Liberal candidate should be left entirely with the open convention of the Liberal party and that the man receiving the most votes be selected and that all others nominated should jump in and help him.

## NEW BUILDINGS FOR RELIEF CAMP NO. 3

Bricks for Building to be  
Manufactured On  
Relief Site

Several new buildings are to be erected at the federal relief camp site Number 3 at Burpee, the work to commence immediately, it was learned by The Daily Mail today. The federal government has issued orders for the work to be started at once, and it will be completed by fall.

The new buildings will include a superintendent's house, a combined pump and electric light station, a garage, and also a combined machine shop and equipment building. An interesting feature is that the concrete blocks for the respective buildings will be manufactured by the men right on the site.

J. C. Veness who is in charge of the work at the camp said today that a fifty foot water tower is now in process of being built. This will supply water to the reforestation nursery. The administration building has already been completed.

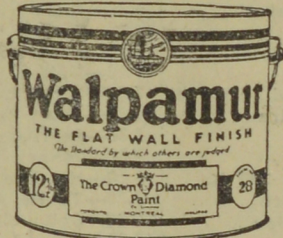
