The Fredericton High School Oratorical Contest last evening was a success and the four hundred people who were present in the audience were treated to high class oratorical efforts by all the young ladies who took part. It is doubtful if any High School in New Brunswick could produce eight young ladies who would excel those who were heard last evening. The Judges took some time to decide the winner. The unanimous verdict was however, that Miss Anne Howie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George E. Howie, Waterloo Row, excelled the other contestants, and was entitled to the prize, a Silver Spoon and five dollars in Cash.

Miss Howie showed exceptional ability in the preparation of her matter and in its presentation. The young lady has a record as a good all round student well up in her class in general work. In amateur dramatic work she is exceptionally good and in last night's contest she showed much talent. She received considerable applause from the audience as well as from her friends and from her girl rivals in the contest when she was announced as the winner.

It was the final presentation of the Oratorical Contest for the girls of the Fredericton High School and was sponsored by the Victor Hatheway Chapter of the I.O.D.E. which organization deserves much credit for promoting these Oratorical Contests. This was public spirited action on the part of the Chapter. That the High School auditorium was well filled showed that this line of school activity is appreciated.

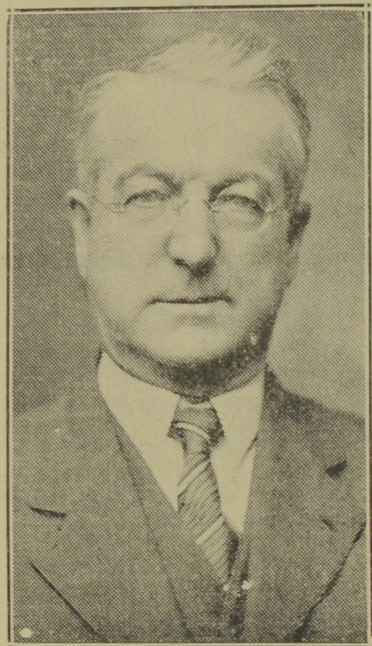
REORGANIZATION L.I.A. AT ANNUAL MEETING HERE

Local Improvement Association Controlled By Pres. and Committee For Coming Year.

Mayor Clark Elected

Civic Improvement Commission Waived; Present Body Adequate, It Is Decided

At its annual meeting held yesterday afternoon in the mayor's office at the city hall the Fredericton Local Improvement Association reorganized for the ensuing year. His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark was elected president and a committee of management consisting of thirteen members was named. This latter committee consists of the president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, three members elect-

ed at the annual meeting of the association, three residents nominated by the provincial government and three residents nominated by the city council. This body which was invested with the control of the association will take the place of a civic improvement commission which had at first been proposed.

To Be Representative

The management committee elected last night will be representative as provided for in amendments to the by-laws made yesterday, which ruled the provincial government and the city council to be represented on the association. In short the re-organized Local Improvement Association will perform the functions which would have been incorporated in a civic improvement commission.

It was felt by the meeting yesterday that the government would co-operate in any improvements made to the city in this respect, as Premier Tilley had announced to His Worship Mayor Clark that he was personally in hearty approval of the proposal.

Officers Elected

The election of officers on the committee of management resulted as follows: President, His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark; Vice-president, J. J. F. Winslow, K.C.; Retiring president, P. C. Robinson; additional association members on the committee, Frank L. Cooper, Miss Jeannette Beverly and R. FitzRandolph. Miss Beverly, Mrs. Coy, Mrs. Robert Phillips, Mrs. C. L. Sypher and Mrs. A. E. Mathewson were named as members of the old burying ground committee.

The opinion was expressed that efforts should be made to increase membership, and it was pointed out

The Scout Campaign

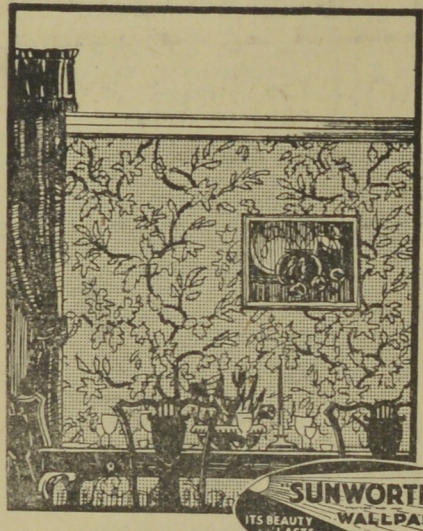
