LONDON, England, Nov. 13 -The Duke of Manchester, who claims assets of only \$25., ended today his examination in bankruptcy on his third failure since the turn of the century. His next step is to apply for discharge from bankruptcy any time within two years

Aside from a bad book debt \$5,000. which was treated as value less, the Duke's assets were only \$25. His amended statement of affairs showed gross liabilities of \$45.630, of which \$44,905 are expected to rank. He attributed his insolvency in part

the reduction of the voluntary a lowance given by the trustees of the will of his mother, who left an estate in the United States valued at petween \$8,000,000 and \$10,000,000.

Until 1929, he testified the trustees' allowance varied from \$35,000 to \$45,-000, but it had since decreased to \$17,500 a year.


In 1925 he said he lost about \$35,-000 in connection with a Canadian mining company.


