5,000 TO GET JOBS

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 13.—More than 5,000 extra men will be taken on for the Christmas rush by the Postoffice Department, it was learned from Hon. J. C. Elliott, who is chief lieutenant to Santa Claus.

Use Air Service

The Postmaster-General has his plans well under way for the huge volume of business the Postoffice must handle in December. Aeroplanes will be used to carry letters and parcels to the Far North.

The Toronto Postoffice will require 1,700 extra hands to help letter-car-

DUKE HAS ONLY \$25

He Lost \$35,000 in Canadian Mine

LONDON, England, Nov. 13.—The Duke of Manchester, who claims assets of only \$25, ended today his examination in bankruptcy on his third failure since the turn of the century. His next step is to apply for discharge from bankruptcy any time within two years.

Aside from a bad book debt of \$5,000, which was treated as valueless, the Duke's assets were only \$25. His amended statement of affairs showed gross liabilities of \$45,630, of which \$44,905 are expected to rank.

He attributed his insolvency in part to the reduction of the voluntary allowance given by the trustees of the will of his mother, who left an estate in the United States valued at between \$8,000,000 and \$10,000,000.

Until 1929, he testified the trustees' allowance varied from \$35,000 to \$45,000, but it had since decreased to \$17,500 a year.

In 1925 he said he lost about \$35,000 in connection with a Canadian mining company.
