The mother stated that they would return for the child in the course of an hour or so, at the conclusion of the show. After waiting for three days and finding that the mother and father had left town, each by different routes, their lady friend decided that she could not hold the baby any longer. She called up another friend of the young father and stated that as she had to go to the funeral of a relative it would not be convenient for her to keep the baby any longer. The baby was then transferred over to another friend, who lives downtown and at whose home the father formerly boarded. This latter family as a consequence have a very nice baby on their hands. MINISTERIAL ASSOC. MEETS RE JAIL PROTEST

Big Meeting at Brunswick St. Baptist Hall This Afternoon

Measures To Be Taken

Eighteen Young Relief Camp Workers Among Prisoners at Jail

Members of the Ministerial Association are meeting this afternoon at two o'clock at the Brunswick Street Baptist church hall in mass protest against conditions at the York County jail, which have been described as "disgraceful" and "disgusting". A full report of conditions existing at the jail was published in The Daily Mail of November 8.

It is anticipated that as a result of today's meeting of clergymen from this city, Devon and Marysville, that urgent recommendations will be made to have conditions improved at the York County jail.

On November 8 ten ministers representing city and county churches accompanied Councillor John F. Deherly of Springhill, to the jail and were shocked at what they saw.

Dark Ages Again?

One clergyman made the statement that the "conditions in the jail are worse than what one reads about the dark ages". Briefly the visiting clergymen found men sleeping like animals on concrete floors, and in dungeon-like compartments; young
