

FREDERICTON FIRM WINNER OF COURT DECISION

Supreme Court Dismisses Claims Against Local Dairy Firm

Judgment Yesterday

Claims Made by Maritime Electric Co., Ltd. Against Gen. Dairies

Claims of the Maritime Electric Company, Ltd. against the General Dairies, Ltd. for \$1,932.82 and against Fredericton Dairies, Ltd. for \$753.51, were dismissed by the Supreme Court of Canada yesterday, according to word reaching here. The result of the action will be learned with interest here.

The Maritime Electric Co., Ltd. had installed, in the premises of the dairies, meters to measure the electrical current consumed, but, to give an accurate reading, the figures shown on the meters required to be multiplied by 10. By neglect of its employees this was omitted and, in consequence, the monthly accounts rendered to the dairies were made out for only one-tenth of the true amount, it was contended.

When asked for payment, the dairies refused on the grounds they acted in good faith; that the erroneous statements misled them; that they paid farmers a price for cream based on the difference between their sale prices and their manufacturing cost, of which power was a factor; and that they should not be compelled to assume losses due to the electric company's negligence.

GOVERNMENT WILL HOLD FINAL MEET NEXT WEEK

Post-Election Confer To Be Held Next Thursday, Is Expected

Cabinet Appointees

Hon. Mr. Dysart Expected To Be Here Soon to Organize New Govt.

The election is over. The smoke of battle is cleared. The Liberals have won a glorious victory in the province of New Brunswick and their feat of capturing 43 of the 48 seats in the Legislature is record-making for New Brunswick.

The Conservative government will hold a post-election cabinet meeting here on Thursday next it is expected. It will be the final meeting of the old government before Hon. Mr. Dysart takes over the reins of power. The meeting is called especially to clear up routine matters and to pave the way for the handing of administrative power over to Hon. Mr. Dysart and his government. However it likely will be several weeks yet before the new Liberal government begins to function.

It is expected that Hon. Mr. Dysart will be in Fredericton within a short time in connection with preparations for taking over the administrations of affairs.

Rumors of what Hon. Mr. Dysart's cabinet will be already have been going the rounds. There has been nothing definite assured, however, as to who will be in the new Liberal cabinet since it is too early to forecast this. Some believe that the Liberal leader will himself take over the post of Minister of Lands and Mines along with that of the premiership, following the example of Premier L. P. D. Tilley. John B. McNair of this city is prominently mentioned to succeed Hon. W. H. Harrison, K. C., as attorney general of the province. Dr. H. W. Harrison, K. C., as attorney general of the province. Dr. W. F. Roberts of Saint John may succeed Dr. H. I. Taylor as Minister of Health. C. T. Richard of Bathurst is mentioned for the post of provincial secretary-treasurer. A. P. Paterson of Saint John may be the new Minister of Federal Affairs. For the post of Minister of Agriculture, F. W. Pirie of Grand Falls is slated to succeed Hon. Lewis Smith some observer believe. W. S. Anderson of Northumberland is mooted as the one to succeed Hon. D. A. Stewart as Minister of Public Works. H. F. G. Bridges is likely to fill the office of Speaker of the House. All of the above are purely conjectural and there has been, and there is not likely to be any announcement of a definite nature for some time.

From the Liberal committee rooms this morning it was stated that the complete organization will be kept intact in preparation for the federal election, only two months away. The Conservatives also have announced intention of keeping their committees at work. Campaigning for the federal election will commence almost at once.

Friends will be pleased to learn that Osborn Brown, who only recently underwent two operations at the Victoria Hospital, is now out and around again and will be able to resume his police duties within a short time.

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TWO LIBERALS ARE GRADUATES OF F. H. SCHOOL

Among the Liberal candidates elected at the general election on Thursday are two Fredericton High School graduates. On the same evening that the 1935 class was graduating from the local High School, election returns coming over the wire stated that two former High School graduates had been elected in their respective constituencies. One was H. F. G. Bridges, elected in Restigouche, and J. J. Hayes Doone, elected in Charlotte.

Mr. Bridges, who is a son of the late Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, principal of the Provincial Normal School, is one of the most popular men in Restigouche county and taught school at Campbellton before practising law. He comes of a family showing ability on both sides. His maternal grandfather, George F. Gregory, later Judge Gregory, was one of the ablest lawyers that New Brunswick ever produced and his uncle, Hon. Francis B. Gregory, is Judge of the Supreme Court of British Columbia. He has a brother, a prominent barrister, in Moncton. The two Bridges boys represent.

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COUNTY COUNCIL TO HOLD SESSION HERE TUESDAY

Finances, Relief Measures To Be Important Topics of Discussion

Abattoir Matter

July Sessions Will Last For Four Days; Relief Problems Vital

The York County Municipal Council will commence its July summer session on Tuesday at the county court house, and in the meeting, which is to last for four days, emphasis will be on county finances and the problem of direct relief costs.

The matter of an abattoir for the central part of the province and consideration of a request for a municipal grant toward the establishment of such public abattoir in this area of the province, also will receive attention from the council. Warden W. J. Gaynor of McAdam is expected to preside.

Recently Peter Neugard of this city appealed to the county finance committee to look into the matter of an abattoir and the matter is expected to be thoroughly discussed by the council here next week. Speaking with The Daily Mail today, W. W. Hubbard, president of the Board of Trade, said he didn't expect a delegation from the board to appear before the council in connection with this matter.
