### Takes Step Towards Control of Business

commission with wide powers of law enforcement, business supervision, of unfair and unethical commercial practices.

Commission recommended placing fruit and vegetable growers under Dominion Marketing Board, establishment of minimum prices for primary products, appointment of a committee of fair practices, licensing of all processors.

Its members said they were "satisfied there is some international control of competition in tin plate" used in can manufacture in which "the price of containers is kept at an exorbitant height while price received by the growers has fallen to unprecedentedly low levels."

With respect to canning companies, the commission expressed the view that secret or discriminatory rebates to customers should be cut out.

In the furniture industry it found 84 per cent of employers in 26 factories with 40 per cent of the industry's output earned \$13 a week or less and that pay for boys 18 or 19 years old ranged up to \$3 a week.

Unless flour milling companies write down their capital structures and capital value of their surplus capacity they are faced with bankruptcy.

If those who direct milling industry persist in maintaining costly structures to the detriment of shareholders and public at large, the report states serious consideration must be given to complete regulation and control of the industry by the government.

"We feel strongly that milling companies should not be permitted to make unauthorized use of their shareholders' money" for market speculation. In 16 months one company lost more than \$3,000,000 in operations which included speculation losses.

Majority of commission recommended setting up of a livestock board with wide powers of supervision and inspection. Three Liberal members doubted wisdom of setting up board, while one dissented from practically the whole report.

Commissioners recommended that all shipments of livestock be made to the public market, where reasonably possible, and that direct shipments to packers be made subject to similar rules as shipments to public yards.

Provincial governments urged to enforce minimum wage laws. Minimum wage boards called upon to seek restitution from employers caught underpaying their workers.

Provinces urged to decrease working week and bring under one control minimum wages and working hours. A working week of 44 hours recommended. Overtime should be paid over the 44 hours.

A volume of 499 printed pages comprises the main and dissenting reports, as well as annexes and lists of exhibits.

minister's letters to Mr. Stevens at the time of his resignation, claiming Mr. Stevens' conduct had been unethical and he made statements to his pamphlet which were "untrue" in whole or in part.

Mr. Stevens said he would again claim the privilege of a member. In answer to the extracts from the prime minister's letter to him he read his own reply to that communication. In the letter he had complained of constant obstruction and criticism from members of the cabinet in his activities on the commission. The letter contained his declaration that to have acceded to the prime minister's request for an apology would have destroyed his usefulness and complained Mr. Bennett had not submitted to him any documentary proof his statements had been inaccurate.

Referring to the October day when he resigned from the cabinet, Mr. Stevens said his pamphlet was under discussion by cabinet with an adjournment overnight. To his annoyance press reports the next day claimed he had been told to resign or apologize to C. L. Burton of Toronto, head of the Robert Simpson store.

"I would not take that position for anybody", exclaimed Mr. Stevens. "I resigned for that purpose and for that

and Pest Act Advisory Board, who spoke on "Pest Legislation and its Effects on Canada's Export Trade of Plants and Plant Products". New Brunswick is the only exporting province which does not have compulsory measures to control the apple maggot situation.

Scott S. Clarkson of the plant pathological laboratory at the Dominion Experimental Station, supplying for the director, J. D. McLeod talked on "Observations on Orchard Diseases in New Brunswick". Other speakers at the afternoon session were A. G. Turney, C. F. Bailey, superintendent of the Experimental Station and L. C. Young, assistant superintendent. These led a discussion on "New Varieties of Apples Under Test in New Brunswick and What Varieties Shall We Plant Today?" Mr. Kilsall gave a talk on Policies of the Nova Scotia Fruit Growers' Association.
