The orchestra will have three interesting numbers in "Poem" by Fibich, "Little Grey Home in the West" and "La Cinquantaine" by Lack.

Thrills of National Ski Championships To Be Broadcast

A radio word-picture of one of the world's most thrilling sports events will be broadcast to the coast-to-coast audience of the WABC-Columbia network today, when the nation's foremost ski jumpers compete for the national championship on the mountainous slopes outside Tacoma, Wash. The broadcast will originate through Columbia's Tacoma outlet, KVI, and will be heard from 6.00 to 6.30 P. M., A. S. T. The contest will determine membership on the U. S. Olympic team.

Three of the network's crack west coast sports announcers, stationed at strategic points along the course, will describe the competition as the daredevil contestants streak down the slope at a mile-a-minute clip.

A test of nerve, stamina and ability for the most coveted honor in sports—participation in the Olympic games—the contest no doubt will see many spectacular spills.

Special shortwave equipment will carry greetings from the skiers poised at the starting line, and the announcers stationed along the course will complete the picture for Columbia listeners as the "snow burners" reach the finish elevation.

Among the noted jumpers who will be in the lineup are Alfred Lindly, Minneapolis, leader of the Mt. McKinley Expedition in 1932; outstanding members of the Rocky Mountain Western Association, including Captain Mike Ashley and Joseph Duncan, Jr., National Cham-

"Last Days of Pompeii" Live Again In Actual Broadcast

One of history's great tragedies—the destruction by an eruption of Mount Vesuvius in the year 79—will be recalled in graphic fashion for American radio listeners on Sunday, April 14, in a special trans-Atlantic broadcast over the WABC-Columbia network. The broadcast, the first ever scheduled from the ruined city of Pompeii, 12 miles southeast of Naples, will be heard in the United States between 1.45 and 2.00 P. M., A. S. T.

Cesar Saerchinger, foreign director for CBS, will reconstruct the Pompeian scene as it was before the volcanic catastrophe, when the city was a favorite seaside resort of the Romans. Saerchinger will be guided through various ruins by Professor Maiuri, an authority on Pompeii.

Part of the broadcast will originate in a temple which dates from the sixth century, B. C., and from the "modern" industrial quarter of the city which was developed just a few years before the city was covered with molten lava and ashes. The recently-restored "villa of mysteries" will be described, as will latest excavations undertaken at Mussolini's orders. Smoking in the background as the descriptions are relayed to America will be Vesuvius, the instrument of Pompeii's destruction.

The broadcast was arranged through the co-operation of Italy's EIAR radio organization. Latest discoveries at Pompeii permit a detailed interpretation of daily life of the

The Orpheus Club of Tacoma, Wash., a male choral group of 70 voices, will broadcast a special concert over the nationwide WABC-Columbia network today from 6.30 to 6.45 p. m., A. S. T. The program will originate through KVI, Tacoma.

Under the direction of Frederick Wallis the club will sing Horatio Parker's "Lamp in the West," "Bubbles" by J. L. Von der Mehden, a vocal arrangement by Envers of Rimsky-Korsakoff's famous descriptive number, "Flight of the Bumble Bee," and Herbert's setting of "Jolly Fellows," by Rhys.

For the past 32 years the Orpheus Club has been recognized as one of the outstanding musical groups in the Pacific Northwest. The club made its debut over the Columbia network on December 30, 1934. In the new broadcast the club will have one of its members, James Petersen, a staff announcer of Station KVI, introduce the individual numbers.

MORE AID IS GIVEN N. S. COAL IN QUEBEC

OTTAWA, April 13—The Dominion Fuel Board announced today that an order-in-council has been passed changing the basis of Nova Scotia coal subsidies on shipments of points in Quebec and renewing the payment of subsidies.

It has been decided, the board explained, that the Government would place Nova Scotia coal on a parity with United States coal in Quebec by paying the difference in competition when the price of American coal is less than that of Canadian at any receiving point in Quebec. This arrangement replaces the old set rate of 1.7 cent per mile per ton on shipments of coal from Nova Scotia to Quebec.

The old rate will remain operative as far as shipments to Ontario are concerned.

Girl Cusses Ball Player, Fined \$250

St. Louis, April 13—Doris Smith, a garment worker on strike at the Forest City Manufacturing Co., here, yesterday was fined \$250 and costs in court on a charge of disturbing the peace of Leo Durocher, shortstop and captain of the world champion St. Louis Cardinals. Miss Smith has announced she would appeal.

Durocher testified that on two successive days Miss Smith threatened and "cussed him" when he took his wife to her work at the Forest City concern where she is a designer.

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
