

FIRE PROTECTION MOVIE TOUR HELD 72 SCREEN SHOWS

Total Attendance at the Shows in the Last Two Months 17,461

Tour to Continue

Under Direction of R.W. Gough; to Continue by Truck in Summer

The Forest Fire Protection Sound Movie Lecture Tour which has been carried on for the past two months by the New Brunswick Forest Service in co-operation with the Canadian Forestry Association, has held to date 72 shows with a total attendance of 17,461, it was announced today by G. L. Miller, head of the New Brunswick Forest Service.

The tour, which is under the direction of R. W. Gough, has completed shows in the northern, eastern and western parts of the Province. Saint John and vicinity, St. George, St. Andrews, St. Stephen, McAdam and Min- to have yet to be covered by the tour.

Schools

The tour has been chiefly confined thus far to the schools and colleges in the Province which are wired for electricity, but following the completion of the tour of the schools the tour will be made by motor truck into the rural districts where the fire hazard is greatest. Power will be supplied the motion picture machine by a Delco plant, so that all the outlying districts may benefit by the tour.

A great deal of interest in the tour has been shown by teachers and scholars who have had the privilege of witnessing the pictures.

On Monday the tour will be continued, beginning at Saint John and continuing through the southern part of the Province.

Scenes

The films include scenes emphasizing the necessity and methods of forest fire protection, life saving, and other educational features in connection with the protection of wild animals and game.

The tour is in reality a continuation of one carried on last fall in Restigouche and Madawaska counties.

The pictures of the game were actually taken on the Tobique and are fine examples of wild animal life in New Brunswick.

Another feature of the films is an address by the Premier and Minister of Lands and Mines, Hon. L. P. D. Tilley. Premier Tilley's address is in both French and English as is the dialogue with the films.

Some new films are expected to be used at the beginning of the summer tour in order that the people in the districts where the tour has passed will not see the same pictures.

FRUIT GROWERS FINISH ANNUAL MEETING HERE

George W. Dingee, of Gagetown, Re-elected President

Several Resolutions

Move To Qualify Growers for Export; to Improve Home Market

At the thirtieth annual meeting of the New Brunswick Fruit Growers' Association, Inc., which concluded here yesterday afternoon, George W. Dingee, of Gagetown was re-elected as president.

The chief resolution passed was that which will request legislation that would replace voluntary efforts to improve the apple maggot situation in this province with compulsory efforts, in order to enable commercial growers to qualify for export and also to improve their position in home and inter-provincial markets. It is understood that the association's provincial apple maggot committee will cooperate with the department in this matter.

State of Officers

The complete slate of officers elected yesterday are as follows: President, G. W. Dingee, Gagetown; vice-president, Frank Noble, Springhill; secretary-treasurer, A. G. Turney, provincial horticulturist; directors, W. G. Gilman, Springhill; A. G. Dunphy, Douglas; F. E. McAlpine, Upper Hampstead. The apple maggot committee was re-elected.

The single resolution passed incorporated also that the department of agriculture take such steps as it may deem practicable for the 1935 season to improve the situation with respect to qualifying for export.

A further step taken at yesterday's meeting was the decision to have the Dominion Experimental Station here to experiment with a trial orchard on an extensive scale, the object being to ascertain what apples of quality would be best adapted to the New Brunswick climate. The matter of advertising was left with the executive, and J. K. King, deputy minister of agriculture and chairman of the New Brunswick Marketing Board will look after the problem of adjusting export rates.

Arthur Kelsall, director of the entomological laboratory at Annapolis Royal and a past president of the Nova Scotia Fruit Growers' Association was asked by Judge A. R. Slipp, if the poorer grades of Nova Scotia fruit could be kept off the New Brunswick Market. Mr. Kelsall said that the only way that such a situation could be averted would be by tightening up the grade of the provincial product. He told the meeting that the New Brunswick product found its way to the Nova Scotia market also.

Treasurer's Report

Included in the report of A. G. Turney, secretary-treasurer, which was presented yesterday afternoon was the announcement that "the major developments of importance last year were the effect of the unusually severe winter of 1933-34 on the condition and future of our apple orchards, also the effect of the curtailment of United Kingdom markets for domestic grades of fall varieties of Canadian apples on the eastern Canadian markets, on which New Brunswick has depended almost entirely up the present time".

HIGHWAYS IN PROVINCE ARE FROST-RIDDEN

Next Few Weeks Will Likely See Roads In Bad Condition

Highway Program

Frost Boils and Damage From Flood Waters in Some Places

With warmer temperatures and flood waters imminent, most of the highways of the province are beginning to show sign of damage and for the next few weeks traffic on most of the roads outside the towns and cities will be extremely hazardous.

Already the heavy frost accumulated through the winter season is making itself manifest in frost boils, and the warmer weather has caused the melting ice and snow to rut many of the highways. Within a week or more the highways near the river will be subject to the regular spring onslaught of flood waters.

The periodic damage to the Oranoch area is expected when the breakup in the St. John river occurs and the highway department is taking the usual precautions to facilitate traffic when that event does occur. Many other places in the province are subject to the same conditions at this time of the year. The heavy accumulation of frost this year may cause worse conditions than in other years.
