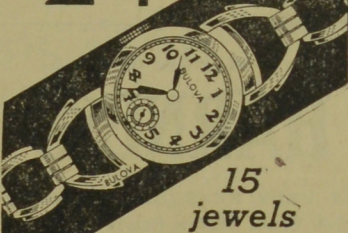

Today they will know the almost forgotten luxury of soap. And children will find warmth under bright-colored and well-stuffed patch work quilts. The very old and very young, for whom sleeping on bare ground is too great a hardship, will have cots and beds.

There will even be communal mirrors for the larger of the scattered tent-settlements around Tracadie, where the half-thousand homeless are quartered—an humane concession to milady's immortal vanity, whether she be grand dame or destitute fire refugee.

There will still be suffering, for five trucks cannot carry even the barest necessities for 500 people. But it will be far less keen.

It is the rendering of services such as these that preserve our faith in humanity. In these glowing terms, Hon. A. A. Dysart, premier and minister of public works, today acknowledged the untiring efforts put forth by various charitable organizations and private concerns on behalf of families victimized by the forest fires of a month ago.
