Were Held On  
Last Sat. Evening**"We are going to stand by our pro-  
mises to the electors, but just give  
us a little time," said Ernest Stairs,  
M.P.P., speaking in the interests of  
the Liberal party Saturday night at  
Brewer's Mills, in answering charges  
from the Conservative party ranks  
that the newly elected Provincial  
Government was showing very little  
activity. Other speakers at Brewer's  
Mills were Bert Sutherland and Abner  
Belyea. At a meeting held on the same  
night at Durham Bridge, the speakers  
were P. J. Hughes, Ralph Limerick  
and A. W. Coombes.Mr. Stairs scorned what he said  
were Mr. Hanson's charges that the  
Liberal party had not given free school  
books. The speaker said that Mr. Han-  
son knows better than to say that.  
He knows that we cannot give free  
school books until we have legislation  
to that effect. Not only that, but the  
contract for the purchase of the school  
books had been let before they came  
into power.Mr. Stairs said that now Mr. Han-  
son charges that the Liberal party in  
New Brunswick has been in power  
two months and hasn't done anything  
yet. He would even charge that they  
had not given old age pensions. The  
speaker said he could remember when  
Mr. Hanson promised old age pensions.  
Five years ago he said that his first  
duty would be to hand an old lady her  
old age pension check. But five years  
passed and the people never got old  
age pensions. Mr. Stairs further said  
that the Liberal party stands by its  
promises to the electors only he said  
that it would take a little time to put  
these promises into effect.In reference to the Stevens' party,  
Mr. Stairs said that we have the Con-  
servative party in power with its high  
protection, we have dissatisfaction and  
we have third parties. In 1896 we had  
the Patrons of Industry, in 1914 we  
had the Farmers' Party, and now we  
have the Stevens' Party. Why was it  
last year we had to dump barrels of  
potatoes? Where is our market in  
Cuba? We used to take Cuban sugar,  
and now we have protection," said
