P. J. Hughes, K.C., Appointed to Investigate and Report

Grave Irregularities

Alleged Activities of Certain Officials of Depart. Public Works

Appointment of Peter J. Hughes, K.C., Fredericton, to investigate and report upon the activities of certain officials of the Department of Public Works in the county of Restigouche prior to July 15, 1935, was announced by Hon. A. A. Dysart, Premier and Minister of Public Works, here yes terday afternoon.

The investigation will hinge around alleged grave irregularities in the payrolls and accounts of certain former employees of the Department of Public Works in the county named during the recent election period. It is under-

stood that payrolfs of two former road are alleged to have taken the form of thrity cents per quart. adding to payrolls the names of persons not employed by the Depart. The prevailin are as follows: ment; allowing the workers more time than was actually worked; allowing accounts for materials not supplied; adding to payrolls the names of children who did not work; allowing chilaren men's wages; and allowing persons remuneration at rates for team or single horse and driver when hand labor only was performed; and allowing team rates when a single horse only was supplied.

Mr. Hughes' instructions emp him to investigate "the accounts, payrolls and conduct of the former road supervisors and bridge superintendent cents. and such other former supervisors, of ficials and employees of the said Department during the said period as the Attorney General may from time to time direct."
