Agricultural School Opens November 5th

young men from that County wishing to attend the Agricultural School. These groups have been composed of one student from each parish and this year again a group of 15 is already enrolled from Madawaska County. Meanwhile many individual applications from all parts of the province are daily being received by O.C. Hicks, principal of the school, at the Department of Agriculture, Fredericton.

An outline of the course lists two livestock courses, under the headings of animal husbandry and veterinary science. There will also be courses in dairying, poultry and horticulture. Handling of crops will be taken care of by instruction in field husbandry, entomology, plant physiology and plant pathology. Lectures in bee keeping and fur farming will also be included, as will instructions in farm management and accounting.

As usual, various prizes will be offered at the conclusion of the course. One of these is offered by the Junior Farmers Association, composed of students of the school, who offer a prize to the student having the highest standing in livestock judging and management.

The Poultry Producers of New Brunswick offer a prize to the student with the highest standing in poultry subjects. The New Brunswick Sheep Breeders' Association offer a prize for highest standing in sheep judging; and the New Brunswick Swine Breeders' Association a prize for highest standing in swine management.
