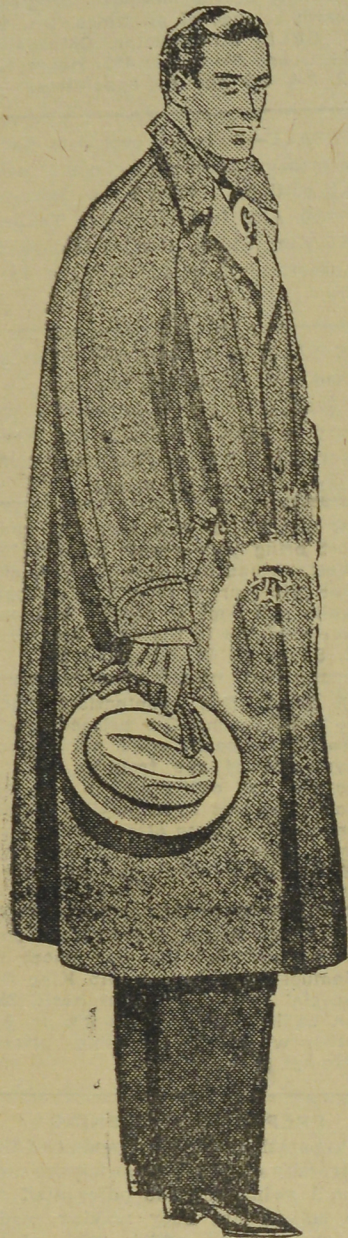

WORLD SERIES OPENS OCT. 2 AT DETROIT

Box Seats \$6.60 With General Admission at \$3.30 — Series to be Broadcast as Usual.

CHICAGO, Sept. 20 — The World Series will open October 2 in Detroit unless the New York Yankees by some feat of Legerdemain should nose out the Tigers, it was decided today by Baseball Commissioner K. M. Landis.

Landis met with representatives of all the teams in both leagues that have a mathematical chance of winning pennants in their respective leagues. Ford Frick, president of the National League, also attended the meeting.

The World Series started in Detroit last year and by custom it should have been ruled that the series start this year in the National League town. Landis heeded the protests of the St. Louis Cardinals in assigning the opening day to Detroit.

The St. Louis outfit pointed out that the American Hospital Association will be meeting in St. Louis on October 2 and for that reason hotel accommodations will be at a premium.

Owner P. K. Wrigley of the League-leading Chicago Cubs protested against opening day in Detroit, but Landis ruled that only the two opening games will be played in the Michigan city.

These two games will be on Oct. 2 and Oct. 3. The series will then switch to the National League city for Oct. 4, 5, and 6, with a return to Detroit for the final games if necessary Oct. 7 and 8.

Prices for the series were also established at the meeting. Blocks of three will be sold for boxes, reserved seats and general admission. Box seats will be \$6.00 each, reserved \$5.50 and the general admission \$3.30. Bleacher seats will be sold for \$1.10 each.

The question of broadcasting rights to the World Series was reserved for further consideration.

DEMPSEY TO ACT AS SECOND

NEW YORK, Sept. 20—Jack Dempsey, former heavyweight champion, will act as second for Max Baer in his fight with Joe Louis, Detroit Brown Bomber, next Tuesday night at the Yankee Stadium.

Dempsey received his second's license today from the New York State Athletic Commission and he will be in Baer's corner for the big fight.

CUBS LEAD THE NATIONAL RACE BY TWO AND HALF

Giants are Practically Out of Running, Need to Win 12 of 14 to Be In — Cards in Second Place.

NEW YORK, Sept. 20—Not a game was scheduled in the major ball leagues today and the rabid rooters were lost without a single box score to provide argument-material so they debated the dazzling derby in the National League.

The Cubs now lead the league, 2½ games ahead of the champion Cards and 7½ in front of Giants. They have seven games left to play, the Cards 10 and the New Yorkers 14.

The Pirates invade the Cub Park tomorrow for a two-game stand, while the Cardinals open a three-game skirmish against the Reds.

From Chicago the Pittsburghers move to St. Louis for two games, while the Cubs enjoy a rest before heading into a five-game series with St. Louis' gas house gang.

If the Pirates could end Chicago's amazing 16-game victory march by taking both engagements, and Frankie Frisch could shoot his Cardinals through five contests with Cincinnati and Pittsburgh without a loss, the five-game series between the two contenders would be crucial indeed.

That would give the champions a one-game lead over the Chicago Cubs to take into the series Chicago would face the task of taking four out of five to secure an outright hold on the flag. Three wins would land St. Louis in the top spot with no questions asked.

NELS STEWART FOR CANADIENS?

MONTREAL, Sept. 20—Ernest Seward announced this morning that the deal for Canadiens is all through but that some more papers have to be signed.

"We will not rush affairs, now but will hold a meeting as soon as everything is ready when we will make our plans known in full," he announced. In the meantime rumor connects Nels Stewart with Canucks, Eddie Oullette and Johnny Sorrell will likely be here.

Minor league executives met with Frank Calder today on a rule discussion. Bill Grant, of Kansas City, representing the "outlaw" American Association, came bearing an olive branch, and it is probable that the league will return to organized hockey.

The league left the jurisdiction of the N.H.L. when Ottawa invaded St. Louis, but are now ready to return. Another N.H.L. schedule calling for an eight club setup has been issued.

"What's your line of work?" asked Ernie as he looked out a pair of spiked shoes.

"I'm a polevaulter," was the reply, "used to vault for California State University. Figure I'd like to try out for this track team. Of course I'm not in shape, but I'll get back into form soon."

LONDON, Ont., Sept. 20 — Jack Nash, of London Hunt, was crowned first champion of the Western Ontario open golf tournament today.

Young Nash, who went farther than any other Canadian player in the recent United States amateur tournament, set an all-time record of 68 for the London Highland Club course in winning the contest yesterday.

Nash was four under the course par and four under his nearest rival, Herb Samways, professional of London Sunningdale Club, who carded a 72 to earn second gross honors. Close behind Samways were Dan Russell, Woodstock professional, and Walter Cunningham, London Hunt professional, who tied with 73's.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Sept. 20—T. C. Russ has been notified by Col. M. J. Winn that his invention, the Lexington barrier, for starting races from walking motion, will be given a good trial at Churchill Downs during the meeting opening on October 12. It will be installed at a point from whence starts are to be made frequently and will be handled by Starter William Hamilton, who for some time has been eager to return to the walk-up system.
