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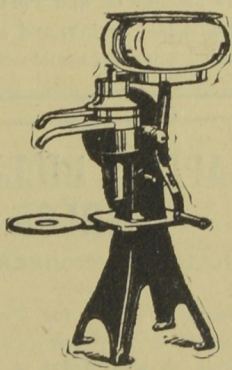

York Council To Give Grant To Abattoir

tion or to investigate as a permanent committee and report at the next session in January.

A motion was made by Coun. Estey and seconded by Coun. W. E. Nason to have the committee continue and report at the next session.

Ald. F. S. Mundle

Ald. F. S. Mundle, Fredericton, who is a member of the city council committee on the abattoir project, addressed the council on the topic of the abattoir and strongly advocated the immediate adoption of the project.

Warden W. J. Gaynor, McAdam, agreed with Ald. Mundle that the committee should have the power to act and not have to put the matter off any longer.

Coun. H. D. Dobie, Devon, was of the opinion that the committee should have the power to act immediately and was sure they would act in the best interests of the county.

Coun. C. L. Grant, Southampton, did not think that anyone had shown where the matter was as urgent as they tried to make it seem. He thought there might be something not quite favourable to the butchers of the county. He said there was no appropriation for the grant and could not see where the money was coming from. He thought that it should be considered further.

Peter Newgard explained to the council that the company did not want the grant now, but only to be assured of it when the abattoir was operating to the satisfaction of the county. He revealed that he had already received assurance of a large amount of financial support, but it will be given only on the assurance that the abattoir will be a public one. He explained that the grant would not have to be paid until some time in July of 1936. If the grant were given now no money would have to be paid until next year. "It is only the assurance that the grant will be available that we want now," he said.

He said the plant would be changed in any way to meet the approval of the county before the grant would be paid.

Coun. Matthew Briggs, Manners-Sutton, was granted leave of absence owing to illness.

FRENCH ORDER WAR PENSION REVISION

PARIS France, July 6—The Government published a decree yesterday ordering readjustment of all pensions except those for veterans actually wounded or sick as a result of war-time service and for dependents of war dead.

The decree which was expected to cut one billion francs from the budget, provided for examination of pensions granted for injuries and sickness not resulting from war and of pensions going to widows, orphans and heirs of veterans whose deaths here not connected with war service.

A commission was named to complete the work by September 20.

MURDERER FEARS GOING UP IN AIRPLANE

NEW YORK, July 6—Merton Ward Goodrich, confessed slayer of 11 year old Lillian Gallaher, will be taken back to Detroit today to answer for that crime and to face questioning about numerous other unsolved crimes against children in which Detroit authorities believe he may be involved.

The trip will be made by train instead of airplan as was originally planned. The 27 year old trap drummer told Duncan C. McCrea, Wayne county, Mich., prosecutor that he was in deadly terror of going up in an aeroplane.

BERLIN, July 6—Another German, called a spy, will soon be beheaded, it was learned today. The condemned man is a high official of the aviation corps.

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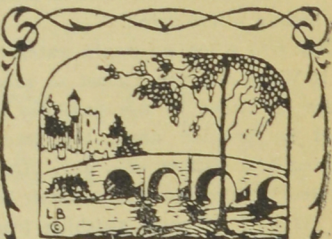
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
