## "Melodiana" Changes Columbia Time Schedule

"Melodiana", the popular CBS half-hour starring Vivienne Segal, Oliver Smith, and Abe Lyman's Orchestra, will be presented on a new time schedule over the WABC-Columbia network, beginning Sunday, July 7. On that date and thereafter the program of slow tempoed waltz music and vocal harmony will be presented each Sunday, from 5:00 to 5:30 P. M., A. S. T., instead of its previous schedule of 8:30 to 9:00 P. M., on Tuesdays.

"Melodiana" formerly known to Columbia listeners as "Accordiana", has been a featured, and exceedingly popular, program of the CBS chain for nearly two years. It is sponsored by Phillips Dental Magnesia.

Though Miss Segal is a comparative newcomer to radio she has long been a favorite of stage and screen audiences. Her most recent starring vehicles have been the Broadway operetta, "Music in the Air", and the musical picture, "The Cat and the Fiddle". Only recently she turned down three offers to star in London stage productions in order that she may continue her radio work.

## 'Trans-Atlantic Bulletin' Series Resumed Over CBS Network

A new summer series of "Trans-Atlantic Bulletin" broadcasts, widely popular with CBS listeners last winter, will be inaugurated over WABC and the nationwide Columbia network on Sunday, July 7, from 12:45 to 1:00 P. M., A. S. T.

As in the previous series, Sir Frederick Whyte will speak to American listeners from London on British current events, and Raymond Gram Swing to the British radio audience from New York on American news topics. Whyte will be heard each Sunday from 12:45 to 1:00 P. M., A. S. T., and Swing each Wednesday. The latter's broadcasts, however, are not heard in this country.

The "Trans-Atlantic Bulletin" programs are presented over the Columbia network in co-operation with the British Broadcasting Corporation to help foster a better understanding between the American and British people.

Sir Frederick Whyte is a well known British writer and diplomat. He was the founder and former editor of "The New Europe". Swing is the Washington correspondent for "The Nation" and equally prominent in American journalism and letters.

The new series is scheduled to run from Sunday, July 7, to Sunday, September 9, inclusive.

"Summer Serenade" a new variety series featuring Ted Fiorito, popular composer-conductor, with his orchestra and an array of assisting talent, will begin over the WABC-Columbia network on Sunday, July 7, from 7:30 to 8:00 P. M., A. S. T. Fiorito and his lively entertainers will perform weekly thereafter at the same time. "Summer Serenade" will originate from the Edgewater Beach Hotel in Chicago where Fiorito is filling a summer engagement at the hotel's Beach Walk. Featured with him in his new series will be his famous song trio, the Debutantes, feminine threesome, starred with Fiorito's orchestra for several seasons; the Fiorettes, comprising May and Dee Gohike, sister harmony team from Houston Texas; Marcellino, long a Fiorito favorite; and "Candy" Johnny Candido, the singing comic with the amazing two-pitched voice.

Widely known not only as an orchestra leader but as the composer of such hits as "Laugh Clown Laugh", "No, No, Nora", and "Three on a Match" Fiorito will offer a breezy informal musical series with unusual novelties and settings of popular music from many fields. In playing at the Edgewater Beach Hotel Ted returns to the scene of his first triumphs where he first attracted attention with the original Oriole Terrace Orchestra.

## "Symphonic Hour" To Feature Works By Beethoven, Etc.

Beethoven's Second Symphony and Mendelssohn's colorful overture "Fingal's Cave", will be the highlights of the "Symphonic Hour", presenting Howard Barlow and the Columbia Symphony Orchestra in their broadcast over the nationwide WABC-Columbia network on Sunday, July 7, from 3:00 to 4:00 P. M., A. S. T. The order of the selections to be played will include the Mendelssohn work as the opening number, followed by the Beethoven Symphony, Cesar Franck's tone poem, "Les Eolides", and the "Cortege and Air de Danse", and the "L'Esprit Prodigieux" by Claude Debussy.

Beethoven's Second Symphony was completed in the year 1802 and was first heard at the Theatre an der Wien April 5. Generally brilliant in mood and orchestration the work offers an excellent contrast to Barlow's other selections. Franck's seldom heard work, "Les Eolides", was his first hearing and was enthusiastically acclaimed. It is Cesar Franck's first work of this class and is a free musical interpretation of Leconte de Lisle's poem of the same name.

## The Clatter Was All That Had Him Upset

NEW YORK, July 5—Since early morning carpenters had been hammering and sawing and making an intolerable clatter in general. They were enlarging the breakfast room of a Westchester country house.

In a bedroom overhead lay a very sick man, whose wife was out of town. He summoned the maid, who was doubling as nurse.

"What time is it?" he asked. "Three o'clock, sir", she informed him.

"I may fall asleep," he said weakly, "but at 5 o'clock I want you to telephone my brother and tell him to come here immediately."

The maid offered to phone then, but he did not want to disturb his brother during office hours. The maid gazed at her master, shook her head and walked out.

At 4:30 the carpenters stopped work and all was silence. At 5 the sick man summoned the maid and told her not to phone his brother. The next afternoon he was in his brother's office.

"I thought", he said, as he related the circumstances, "that I would be dead within three or four hours, but it never occurred to me that those carpenters had anything to do with the way I felt—not until they stopped work."

## Church Seances Banned By Bishop

LONDON, July 5—The Bishop of London Rt. Rev. A. F. Winnington-Ingram, issued an order yesterday forbidding any church building in his diocese to be used for seances and warned people against the "peril" of getting in touch with spirits through spiritualism.

Writing in his Diocesan leaflet, he urged them to give up "this unauthorized attempt to communicate with the other world" and described their efforts as "very dangerous, dishonoring to the dead and waste of time for the living".
