

ST. DUNSTAN'S CONTRIBUTION TO MISSIONS LARGE

Between \$600 and \$700
Yearly is a Fine
Record

Philanthropic Work

Report of Pastor Shows
Extensive Interest in
Social Work

Yesterday was Mission Sunday at St. Dunstan's Church and a special collection for foreign missions was taken up.

At High Mass, Rt. Rev. Msgr. F. L. Carney spoke on the work of the Catholic Church in the foreign mission field. He stated that there were at the present time sixteen thousand priests, over forty thousand women workers, including Sisters, who were doing duty as teachers, nurses, conducting orphanages and engaged in other social work. There were also seven thousand Lay Brothers engaged in the various branches of missionary activity. One young man left Saint John during the past week for the foreign mission field and another Saint John man who has been home for a time is returning to the field.

For several years past St. Dunstan's congregation has through its different missionary societies and by special collections contributed on an average of between six and seven hundred dollars per year toward mission work. In addition to the contributing of money for the purpose of sending out missionaries from Canada to the foreign fields, money is contributed for the upkeep of these missions, the education of foreigners for church work in their own countries, and towards many hospitals and orphan homes carried on in these countries. All over New Brunswick in the Saint John and Chatham dioceses these contributions are being made in a quiet way and have been carried on in this way for several years.

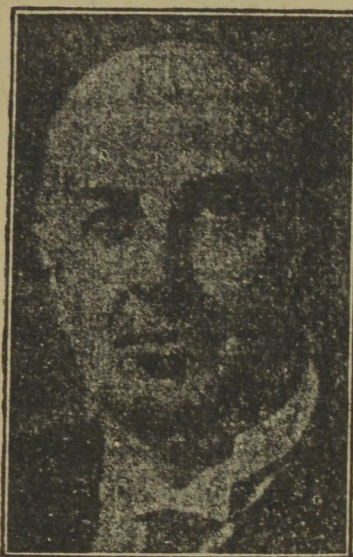
HON. MR. HANSON MAY LEAD LOCAL CONSERVATIVES

It is Stated that He May
Become Provincial
Leader

Will Squires Resign?

Conservatives Advocating that Mr. Hanson
Save Local Situation

Friends of the Conservative party in New Brunswick are advocating Hon. R. B. Hanson, K.C., Minister of Trade and Commerce in the defeated Bennett government, as provincial leader of the party. It is pointed out by Hon. Dr. Hanson's political friends that his party requires a man of his calibre as leader in the Legislature, and they point out also that Hon. J.

B. M. Baxter, who was a former Cabinet Minister at Ottawa, came back to the Legislature as leader of his party in that body.

One of the advocates of this latest move in the political game is the Saint Croix Courier of St. Stephen, which comes out with an Editorial on the subject. How Mr. Hanson is to get into the Legislature is not stated as the party has only five seats in the provincial house. Three of these are held by the members from Carleton County including Hon. F. C. Squires, late Speaker in the House under the Tilley regime, and his two colleagues. The two other seats are in the County of Saint John. None of these gentlemen are liable to resign to accept positions as the Liberal party are now entrenched in both the Federal and Provincial fields. It is said however, that Mr. Squires, with an eye on the distant future, should his party get back to power, may be induced to retire and devote his time to his private practice, thus leaving a seat open on which Hon. Mr. Squires may try his chances.

It is also stated that the Conservative party are determined to at once start active organization so as to be ready for both the Federal and Provincial elections when the time again rolls around. They feel that with Hon. Mr. Hanson as a leader either with in or without the Legislature, they can accomplish much. Mr. Hanson may spend the winter in the South, and then take up the work.

The lack of good organization and practically no newspaper support is blamed by one man as large contributors to the defeat of the party this year.

While walking with two other women at Haneyville on Sunday evening at seven o'clock, Mrs. Charlotte Morehouse was struck a glancing blow by the Chevrolet sedan driven by H. R. Purdy of Saint John. She suffered a bad cut in her hip and was brought at once to the Victoria Hospital for treatment. The handle of the car door struck Mrs. Morehouse when the driver attempted to pass the three women who were walking abreast on the highway, before the arrival of another car which was coming towards him from Saint John. Dr. A. F. VanWart of this city attended the injured woman. She was reported to be resting easier today, but will be confined in the hospital for at least 10 days.

They plan to hold a meeting early this week.

He pointed out that while singing "Old MacDonald had a Farm", or playing "Puss in the Corner", Had there place, Young People should consider Recreation which has definite carry-over values also.
