Low Railway Fares For King's Jubilee

In connection with the forthcoming celebrations to commemorate the twenty-fifth anniversary of His Majesty's accession to the throne of the British Empire on Monday, May 6, the railways of Canada are offering the public low holiday fares for the long week-end on this occasion, with a generous time allowance for the return movement, it was announced today by C. P. Riddell, Chairman, Canadian Passenger Association.

Railway fares will be on the basis of single first class fare and one quarter for the round trip good between all stations in Canada for departure from 12 o'clock noon Friday, May 3, to 2 P. M. Monday, May 6. Passengers may leave destination as late as midnight of Tuesday, May 7, thus providing a maximum of four and a half days in which to enjoy an outing associated with this unique event in the history of the Empire and in the life of the Sovereign.

In view of the Dominion-wide character of the celebrations which will take place at this time and the favorable spring period for travelling, the railways anticipate a heavy flow of passenger traffic throughout the Dominion, particularly to the larger centres where impressive ceremonies will be held and other Jubilee activities take place.

In preparation for this traffic, the railways are commencing to marshal extra equipment in order that the travelling public may be fully accommodated.

CARNIVOROUS PONIES THREATEN THE HUSKIES

EDMONTON, Alta., April 24—Carnivorous cayuses, whose owner claims they will push huskies out of the northern transportation limelight, have been brought to Edmonton by Francis Wharton, 32 years old, from his cabin at Primrose Lake, 300 miles north of here.

The cayuses, three Shetland ponies to be exact, have been used by Wharton, hitched in tandem, to pull a heavily loaded 13-foot toboggan and, in 11 days they covered the 300-mile journey to Edmonton. The animals are 36 inches tall.

Wharton bought the animals in Calgary three years ago and did not discover they would eat meat or fish until they had been in his possession for some time. The team's consumption of fish accounted for 386 white-fish in two months.

And the animals aren't particular. They will eat fish, moose meat, rabbits, or what-have you. Their regular diet is one pint of boiled wheat or oats a day.

In the summer the ponies will pack 100 pounds, working in muskeg country. On the winter trail they travel much more rapidly than dogs and can out-march larger horses, the owner says.

Old Times Recalled

The following paper by Rev. Dr. Wightman was read before the York and Sunbury Historical Society on Wednesday. At the request of a number of our readers who are interested we are publishing the paper in installments.

OUR FORGOTTEN BURIAL PLACES AND THEIR HISTORIC VALUE

(Continued from yesterday)

The following are some of the inscriptions on the grave stones, in many instances scarcely legible from long exposure to the elements:

Inscriptions on Old Grave Stones in Old Cemetery, Robertson's Point: No. 1—Large well cut freestone slab, as follows:

"Sacred to the memory of Jacob W. Dykeman who departed this life, Nov. 8th, 1827, aged 32 years, 1 month and 18 days."

"The memory of this mortal clay This widow's heart doth mourn When fates predestination snatched Him to a world unknown."

"His helpless babes will oft lament And mourn a father's loss; But God their shield will be, Their refuge in Emmanuel's cross."

No. 2—Medium size freestone, well cut and in good condition.

"In memory of James, died 27th Sept. 1850, aged 6 years; Mary W., died 20th Sept. 1850, in the 12th year of her age, and David E., died 17th Sept. 1850, Children of Alexander and Sophia McIntosh.

(J. Milligan, Stone Cutter) Note: These three children evidently died of some fatal contagion as all died within a few days of each other.

N. 3—Stone similar to above. "In memory of David McIntosh, Died 9th Jan., 1845, aged 69 years. "The memory of the just is blessed."

No. 4—Well cut freestone: "Margaret, wife of Geo. P. Farris, Died Aug. 9th, 1855, Aged 36 years."

"A loving wife and mother dear A faithful friend lies buried here; She parted with a world of pain, And only sleeps to rise again."

No. 5—Well cut stone: "In memory of William McIntosh who died June 6th, 1861, aged 54 years." (Father of children spoken of). S. P. Osgood, Stone Cutter.

No. 6: "In memory of Robert Orchard died Nov 30th, 1857, aged 65 years." (Evidently born 1792).

"He was a dutiful son An affectionate brother A loving husband and father Deeply regretted by all who knew him."

No. 7—This is a granite slab, well cut and partly polished and with others enclosed in an iron railing with cut granite posts. The inscriptions follow:

"In memory of Samuel White, born Mar. 14th, 1787, Died April 8th, 1870 and Elizabeth McFarlane his wife, Died Jan. 24th, 1875. Aged 88 years." (Continued tomorrow)
