

FARMHOUSE OF F. A. GOOD IS BROKEN INTO

Intruders Enter House
With Skeleton Key
Via Front Door

Police on Case

Break Discovered Monday
When Visited By
Owner

The farmhouse at Sunnyside Farm, Allanview, owned by F. A. Good of this city, was ransacked recently by marauders, it was learned today. The break was made, it is thought, during the latter part of last week or early this week. As far as is known nothing was taken, but a complete checkup on the belongings has not yet been made. The R.C.M.P. are working on the case and are of the opinion that an arrest will be made shortly.

Mr. Good and his son Alvah Good, visited the farm house on Monday afternoon for the purpose of preparing the place for summer habitation. It was evident when they entered the house that someone had been there throwing things about. Drawers were emptied and everything in the building had been disturbed as though someone had been looking for some particular object.

Signs were noted on a window where it is believed the intruder had tried to raise it, but the window was locked. It is believed that they entered through the front door opening it with a skeleton key.

The nearest house to the Good property is one occupied by James Belanger. It is about 200 yards away. None of the neighbors had noticed anyone unusual about the place, Mr. Good stated.

Change Will Take Place
June First; Move
Imperative

50 P.C. of Business There

James Bremner, Sect'y-
Treasurer, in Hartland
Today

Mr. Bremner stated to the Daily Mail today that everybody is looking for better business in the live stock line and that the Club's revenue from registrations and transfers is 43 per cent above the revenue for the corresponding month of last year. This increase in business is attributed largely to the stimulation from heavy export to the United States.

Carload At Harvey

A carload of cattle is leaving Harvey this week for New Jersey. It is the third carload to be exported from there this spring. Mr. Bremner will return from Hartland tomorrow and will probably proceed to Toronto next week on business connected with the club.

Transfer of the head office of the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club from Fredericton to Toronto, is taking place June 1st, James Bremner, secretary-treasurer, reported that business matters in connection with the use of the Jersey milk trade mark have increased markedly in recent months in Ontario, making the move imperative.

The head office of the club has been here for four years, but owing to the fact that over 50 per cent. of the club's work is done in Ontario the change is absolutely necessary. Toronto is a more central location for the head office.

Today Mr. Bremner is in Hartland arranging for a Jersey cattle sale, which will take place in May. The sale will be the largest of one breed ever held in the Maritime Provinces and will include largely the dispersal of the Dr. L. D. C. MacIntosh herd.

MID-WEEK MARKET

Today's Phoenix Square market was a fairly large one with the usual quantity of produce. Prices were about as they were on Saturday, with a slight drop in some things. The prevailing prices were as follows: Eggs, 20 to 22c per dozen; butter, 25 to 28c per pound; potatoes, 75c per barrel; maple sugar, 40c per cake; maple syrup, 4c to 6c per pound; veal, 5c to 10c per pound; pork, 10c to 13c per pound; carrots \$2.50 per barrel; chicken, 30c per pound; turnips, 75c per barrel; Gaspereaux, 35c per pound; wood, \$7 to \$8 per cord.

COLLECTIONS GOOD

According to a statement by Fred I. Haviland, city clerk, collections of arrears taxes are coming in better than this time last year. This is taken as an indication of better financial conditions in the city. The city officials are making a special drive to collect arrears before the 1935 notices are sent out on June 1st.

DAMAGE FROM ICE RUNNING IS NOT SERIOUS YET

Expectation That 1935
Freshet Will Cause No
Heavy Damage

Jams on Highways

Chunks of Ice Crowd
Highways and Floods
In Some Places

While the accumulation of winter ice hurried swiftly out of the St. John river today, and piled huge chunks of ice along the river bank and in the highways, nevertheless the expectation today was that the accruing damage this year will not be disastrous, and will probably be less than in other springs.

All along the St. John river today was a barrier of ice, resulting from the crowding of the huge chunks of ice onto the shore. In some places this moving barrier upset barns, hurled huge pieces of ice against shore farmhouses all along the river-front. The danger from a further rise in the river water today has caused anxiety among the residents along the river.

Water Drops Here

John Malloy, engineer at the pumping station, reported that the water at this point had taken a two-foot drop since yesterday, but today with the warmer weather on the scene, the water began to rise again.

The warmer weather is causing especial alarm today to the residents

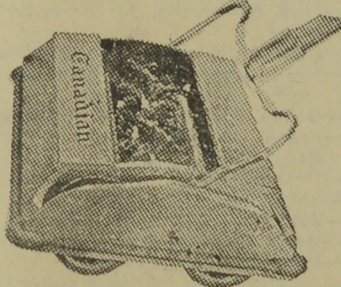

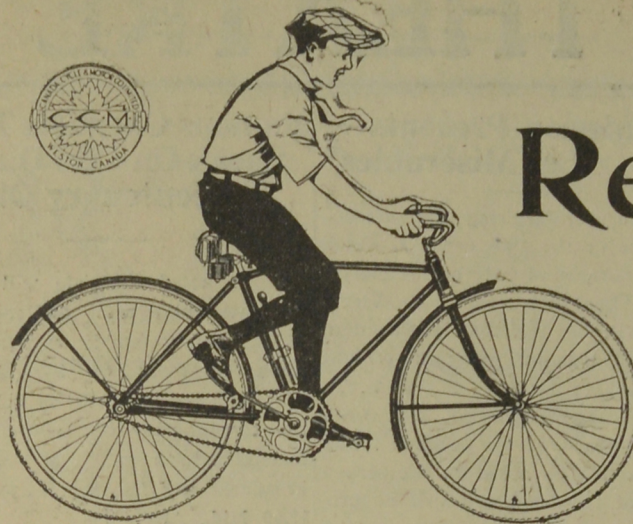
