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## NEW PROVINCIAL CABINET TONIGHT

### One Thousand Nazis Attacked Jews And Suspected Jews

Tourists Injured By A Lot of Crazy Fools In A Berlin Hotel - Many Jews Beaten Up.

BERLIN, July 16—Further anti-Jewish riots have broken out in Berlin and vicinity. Over one thousand Nazis caused a wild scene in Berlin last night as they rushed through the streets beating and stoning Jews and those suspected of being Jews.

While no deaths are reported to have taken place still there were scores of persons assaulted. Some of them dangerously so. Hotels and other leading public and semi-public buildings were damaged.

Tourists visiting in the city were scattered about considerably and in some cases were subject to insult.

As some 800 Nazis descended on the Kurfuerstendamm, known as a favorite gathering-place for Jews, throngs flocked to the thoroughfare from all over Berlin's west end. The attackers, seizing and beating every man who they thought looked like a Jew and shouting "Down with the Jews!" and "Throw the Jews out!" spread through all the cafes of the district.

Fifty-two detachments of helmeted police were rushed to the Kurfuerstendamm in riot cars. They found men being dragged and kicked in the street, the cafe terraces being smashed right and left, and a shouting crowd lining the sidewalks. One officer drew his revolver but the crowd was so threatening that his comrades forced the arm back in its holster.

The Jewish proprietor of another big cafe, one of the largest in the district, was dragged out and badly beaten, and one of his employees was knocked unconscious by a stone hurled by the marauders. A flying squad of Nazis chased another Jew the full length of the Kurfuerstendamm and then spared him when he cried out: "I am a foreigner!" "Then become a citizen!" he was told.

Most of the raiders wore brown shirts under their coats and wore the boots of Storm Troopers.

As the rioting reached its height, cafes all along the Kurfuerstendamm doused their fights and tourists rushed for the upstairs rooms in the darkness. In the street the Nazis were assailing blocked automobiles and dragging their occupants out for interrogation.

A Kurfuerstendamm film theatre showing an anti-Jewish film was thrown into an uproar when a band of Nazis suddenly interrupted the performance, shouted for lights, and then proceeded to throw out boldly all men in the theatre suspected of being Jewish.

Unable to keep order in the turmoil police tried to round up foreigners and escort them to safety. A number of Canadians were believed to be among them. Above the shouts of those struggling resounded the cries of Nazis selling, Der Stuermer, organ of the Nazi district chief for Franconia, Julius Streicher, outstanding anti-Semitic of the Third Reich.

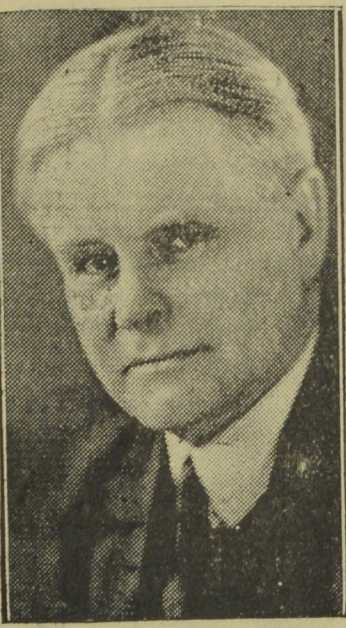

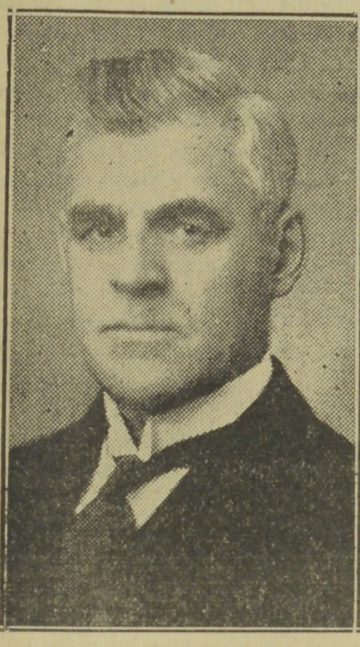

### IRVINE RUNS AGAIN FOR PARLIAMENT

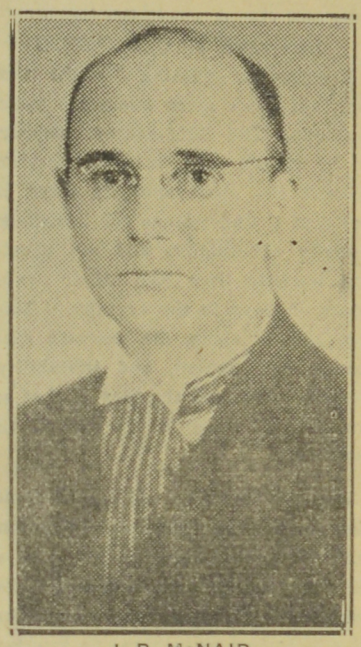

#### ECLIPSE OF MOON

Mistress Moon got in one of her reputed tantrums last night and people here didn't see her put on her famous eclipse act. There was a wide craning of necks all over the continent to see the heralded total eclipse scheduled for 12.15 p.m. (Atlantic Daylight time). In some places the super-spectacle was discernible but here a sudden downpour of rain veiled the heavenly proceedings. The rain lasted long enough in the capital to keep curious citizens from getting a glimpse of what would have been witnessed as a partial eclipse at least. It was recorded as the first complete eclipse of the moon since 1927 and the longest in half a century. The phenomena was due to last from 12.15 to 1.09 o'clock. The superstitious are inclined to blame St. Swithin for not being able to see the sight. The St. Swithin legend is that if it rains on July 15 there will follow forty days of rain. And St. Swithin certainly queered things last night.

### FLYING FORBIDDEN OVER JAIL AREAS

Amendment Made to 1920 Air Regulations Bans Craft.

OTTAWA, Ont., July 16—Aircraft are forbidden now to fly over Canadian penitentiaries, according to an amendment to the 1920 air regulations and approved by the Governor-in-Council. Previously the restrictive regulation prohibited aircraft from flying over "any fortress, arsenal, factory, dockyard, camp, ship, office or other like place in Canada belonging to His Majesty".

The regulation relating to penitentiaries reads:

"No aircraft shall fly over any penitentiary in Canada, or over any prison or public institution or lands appertaining thereto as is pursuant to the Penitentiary Act and no aircraft shall be used for the purpose of obtaining any information whatsoever in regard to these".

For some years pilots have been furnished with the location of such institutions and have been given to understand the Government frowned upon flights in their neighborhood. Not until now, however, has the ban been given expression as a regulation.

### U. S. Fliers To Help Ethiopian Forces

GRASSE, France, July 16—Hal du Berrier, former United States commercial air pilot, announced yesterday he had recruited 12 American fliers for Ethiopia.

Du Berrier said Maj. Granville Pollock, veteran of the old Lafayette Escadrille, was aiding him to raise a force to form a nucleus for an Ethiopian air corps. "We are willing to fight for an ideal", said du Berrier.

He said Emperor Haile Selassie would furnish the planes but he refused to say when he planned to go to Addis Ababa. His party, he hoped, "will be greatly strengthened" in Egypt.
