## HIGH GRADE PAPER PULP DISCOVERED

GEORGETOWN, British Guiana, July 16—A new source of high-grade paper pulp has been developed in the British Guiana jungle, Conservator of Forests B. R. Wood said today.

An economical process of bleaching Wallaba Timber, the Conservator asserted, rendered the wood suitable for use in paper-making. For years British Guiana's Imperial Institute had sought the secret of making Wallaba useful, though the announcement said it was a private concern that finally perfected the new method.

It brought hope of a substantial industry for the colony. Large areas of Wallaba lie a short distance from the coast, easily accessible.

HAMILTON, Ont., July 16—For the 10th consecutive year, William O'Connor, Roman Catholic, drove in the Orange parade.

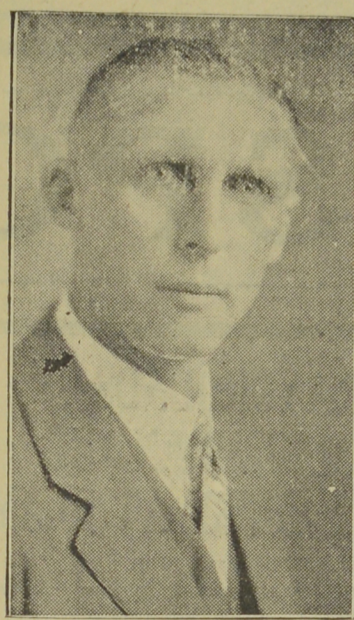
"I look forward to the parade each year," said O'Connor, who drives the official city car containing the mayor and party.

## CATHOLICS APPEAL TO KING GEORGE

Monrach Asned to Intercede in Belfast 'Bloody' Rioting.

GLASGOW, Scotland, July 16—John C. Campbell, secretary of the Catholic Union of the Arch-diocese of Glasgow yesterday telegraphed King George asking him to intercede to halt religious disorders at Belfast.

The telegram, copies of which were sent to the Prince of Wales, and Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin read: "On behalf of 500,000 Catholics in the Archdiocese of Glasgow, I appeal to Your Majesty to intervene immediately in order to bring an end to the dreadful bloodshed and scourging at Belfast, causing the misery and ruin of countless thousands of British subjects".

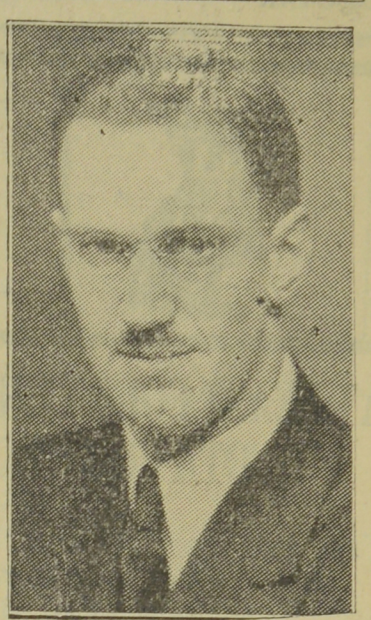

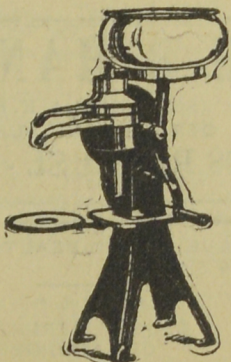
