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## LIBERALS SWEEP NEW BRUNSWICK

### Tilley Gov't Goes Down to One Of Worst Defeats In History Of Provincial Political Affairs

Only Five Conservatives in Two Counties Elected; Premier and All His Cabinet Defeated — The Premier Congratulates Dysart — York Is Redeemed by McNair, Gunter, Stairs and Durling.

In one of the greatest turnovers in the political history of New Brunswick, the Liberals swept the province from Restigouche to Charlotte County. Only two counties comprising five seats, returned Tilley Government candidates, Carleton County sending back to the Legislature Hon. Fred C. Squires, the Speaker in the last House E. W. Melville, and G. W. Perry, all of whom were representatives in the last House. Robert McAllister and A. C. Smith, Government candidates, were elected in Saint John. These five seats were all that remained over from the Tilley party while the Liberals carried forty three seats throughout. Premier L. P. D. Tilley and all his Cabinet were defeated in their respective constituencies.

One of the biggest surprises throughout the province was the big victory in York County by the Opposition ticket. J. B. McNair, Alderman Ralph Gunter, E. W. Stairs and S. E. Durling They simply swept the City and County and put old York back in the Liberal column after having been Conservative since 1903. In that year Messrs. W. T. Whitehead, George W. Allen, John Campbell and George W. Burden were elected. In 1908 a ticket composed of R. W. McLellan, Col. W. J. Osborne, Clarence Goodspeed and Samuel Hatheway, running in the interests of the Robinson Government was defeated and so was the Government.

In recent years in York County politics was mixed up with religion in certain sections both in the Dominion and Provincial elections and the Conservatives have allowed it to be used. This is one of the things which helped to defeat them in this county yesterday, and Mr. McNair deserves credit in having the courage to take hold of this disgraceful thing and drag it out in the open. It is to be hoped that those who have carried this campaign on both in York and Sunbury county have had their lesson and that this is the last which we will ever hear about this old cry in York county.

The Liberals in York county have never had better organization than in this campaign. It was perfect. The men in this city, such as Abner B. Bejvea, secretary York county, J. Bacon Dickson, and Moses Mitchell, Allison Mackay, R. B. Dayton, Clarence J. Goodspeed, Dr. J. C. MacCoy, Wm. McLellan, Edward King, E. E. Burden, C. R. Barry and Roy Barker deserve credit for their wonderful work in organization. They were on the job night and day. J. B. McNair and Ralph Gunter were wonderful men to work with and they inspired the others.

As the campaign closed, one man was missing who started out full of hope but who did not live to see it realized. He was C. R. Hawkins, president of the Liberal Association who died suddenly a couple of weeks ago. There was sadness at the Government committee rooms last night amongst all the victory over Bob's absence from the scheme of things.

Word sent out by Premier Tilley from Saint John said that the Tilley Government would hand over the seals of office to Hon. Mr. Dysart as soon as possible. It is probable that Hon. Mr. Tilley and his colleagues will come to Fredericton early next week to hold the final meeting of the present Cabinet and to clean up their affairs.

Premier L. P. D. Tilley, K.C., shortly after the defeat of his party became definite last evening, announced that he would arrange to turn over the reins of office to Hon. A. A. Dysart, K.C., the victorious Liberal chief, as soon as possible.

"The result of the election in New Brunswick," the defeated premier said, "has been similar to the result of elections in other provinces where governments have been in power during the time of depression. The outcome of the elections has been most pronounced."

Premier L. P. D. Tilley last evening telegraphed his congratulations to

Hon. A. A. Dysart, leader of the victorious Liberal party.

"I congratulate Hon. Mr. Dysart and his followers on their victory and I trust in these difficult days of government they will be able to carry on and implement at the next session of the Legislature legislation in compliance with the wishes of the people."

Unfortunate Situation

"The unfortunate situation, however if I may be permitted to say so, is that there has not been a sufficiently strong opposition elected to the House. It is always good for any government no matter what party it belongs to, to have a reasonably strong opposition."

"During my term in office I have striven to do the best I could in the interests of the province."

"The conduct of our campaign throughout was exemplary. I take this opportunity of thanking all those who supported my government for their loyal and energetic assistance."

"The opposition has won a sweeping victory, and I am good sport enough, I trust, to take a defeat in a broad-minded way. Had I been returned to the House, in opposition, I should have felt it my duty to have made from time to time constructive criticisms and to have frankly supported what enactments were introduced by the government which I believed for the benefit of my province and its people."

"Colonel Harrington, leader of the late Nova Scotia government, remarked on his defeat that he had added 20 years to his life. I can at least say I have added a few to mine. As speedily as possible I will prepare to hand over the reins of government to Mr. Dysart and his followers."

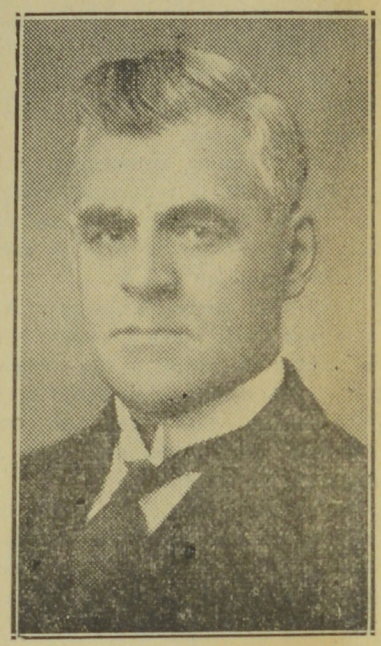
Premier Tilley when he heard the result of the election, was at the government headquarters in the Seaman's Mission with Hon. W. H. Harrison, K.C., attorney general, Dr. W. W. White, and Ralph G. McInerney, the other defeated city candidates. Each of the candidates made brief addresses thanking their supporters, many of whom were present, and expressing confidence that the Conservative party would strike a decisive comeback in the next provincial general election. Robert McAllister and A. C. Smith, the successful county Conservative candidates, were loudly cheered when they arrived at the headquarters.

#### New York State To Show \$90,000,000 Deficit

NEW YORK TO SHOW

NEW YORK, June 28—New York State will end its fiscal year Sunday with a \$90,000,000 deficit, Governor Herbert Lehman said yesterday. This is 15,000,000 more than he estimated in his budget message last January.

### Yesterday's Election

The defeat of the Tilley government in New Brunswick yesterday was not a surprise to those who have followed the trend of political events during recent months. The extent of the Liberal victory, however, while predicted by some, was hardly expected by others. The defeat of Premier Tilley, personally, and his entire ticket in Saint John as well as the entire Tilley cabinet by their different counties was hardly to be expected. The sweep was the greatest in the political history of the Province, except that of the election in the Flemming days, when the Liberals held only two seats in the Legislature of that day.

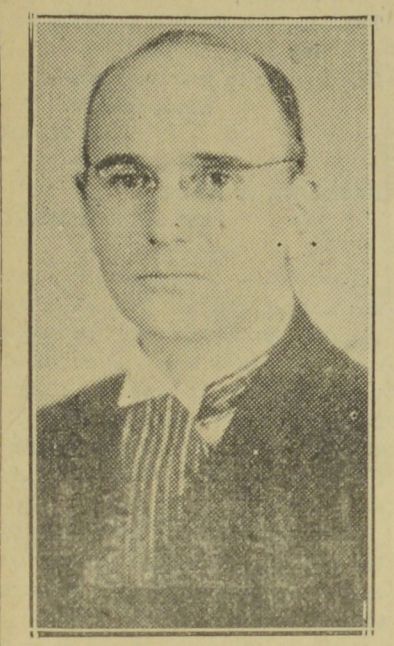
York County goes Liberal again for the first time since the election of 1903, when Messrs. Whitehead, Allen, Campbell and Burden were elected. They were defeated in 1908. The result in York was due not only to the same desire for a change which inspired the rest of the Province but also to the excellent organization of the Liberal party and to the wonderful fight of the candidates, Messrs. McNair, Gunter, Stairs and Durling. Mr. McNair deserves the thanks of the Province as well as of York County for breaking up a certain rotten form of campaign which has been a disgrace to this county in recent years. All credit is due to the respectable independent electors of York County, who rose above petty prejudices and voted as they believed right—both Liberals and Conservatives.

The fact that Hon. Premier Tilley was one of the first to congratulate Hon. Mr. Dysart on his election and on the return of his party to power shows the kind of a man Mr. Tilley is. Many Liberals as well as Conservatives, will regret Mr. Tilley's personal defeat in Saint John. He tried to do his best—but he took the helm after the ship had begun to sink.

Hon. Mr. Dysart, who has had a long service as a public man will now have an opportunity to make good. He has a big programme but he and his new cabinet ministers should give the province good government. They are all strictly honest and sincere and there should be some excellent cabinet timber in the new House. York County will be in the cabinet both because she deserves it and because she has one of the outstanding Liberals in the Province, J. B. McNair, provincial president of the Liberal party. Mr. McNair is qualified to fill any important cabinet position which offers.

The fight is over. The smoke of the battle has cleared away. Let us all get down to business and leave the Province in the hands of those whom the people, by a large majority, have decided should rule for the next five years.

#### Its Just As Well Box Was Concealed

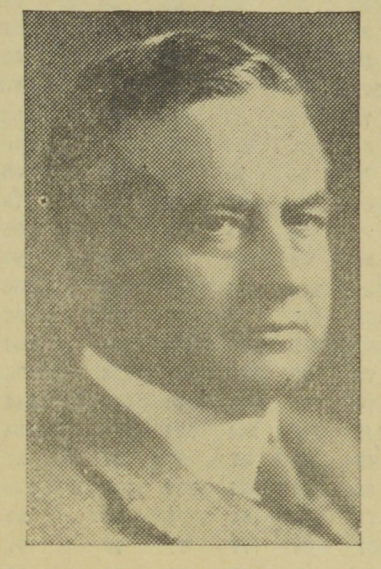
New Orleans, La., June 28 — When firemen extinguished the blaze that threatened to destroy the truck of Joseph Mitchell, they considered it a routine job.

#### Adopt A Child Week Given Endorsation Of N. B. Government

In a letter to the people of New Brunswick, Premier Tilley and members of the New Brunswick government have expressed their warmest sympathy and approval regarding the plan of the New Brunswick Protestant Orphanages, the Catholic Home Finding Association and the Children's Aid societies to conduct an "Adopt A Baby Week" campaign from July 7 to July 13.

Premier Tilley stated that no effort should be spared to bring about the universal appeal which should concern every childless home in particular and other homes where circumstances may be favorable for the adoption of little ones. The organizations directly concerned with the campaign will be glad to furnish all information.

Hon. David A. Croll, minister of welfare in Ontario, contacted H. Usher Miller of the N. B. Protestant Orphanages' Home, during the "Adopt A Baby Week" campaign in that province. He declared that hardly a child would be left in the Children's Aid shelters of that province. Premier Hepburn and his wife adopted a boy and girl.

The children are well cared for in the institutions, authorities stated, but it is difficult for them when they are of age to care for themselves, especially without parental guidance. There is no lack of childless homes in New Brunswick, they declared. It is hoped the response will be as generous, as the need of the homeless child is great.

#### Gang War Blamed For Street Slaying

NEW YORK, June 28—Sebastino Mano, alias Frank May and Frank Italiano, was shot to death on a Brooklyn street yesterday by two men who escaped in an automobile. Police blamed a feud among racketeers for the killing. Mano was dangerously wounded by gangsters in October, 1930, but recovered.

Mano stepped from an automobile which he had driven to the curb, when the two killers approached on the sidewalk and fired 10 shots at him. Five bullets entered the body.

#### With All Four Candidates, McNair, Gunter, Durling and Stairs Swept Into Power—Liberals Held Grand Demonstrations Last Night.

York county went wild last night as the final returns in the provincial election disclosed that all four Liberal candidates were elected in this county. The demonstrations began early in the evening throughout the county as it became evident that the Liberal party was inevitably swinging into the limelight of provincial politics, after a lapse of ten years.

While every parish and polling station in the province had their own special celebration, the city of Fredericton put on the grandest show of them all. From about eight o'clock in the evening until twelve o'clock throngs paraded the streets of the Capital.

Crowds of people swarmed Queen street last night and were wildly demonstrative. There were catcalls for the defeated Government candidates and cheers for Dysart, and the four York county Opposition candidates.

#### Lighted Bonfires

Liberal supporters gathered in huge throngs in front of the homes of Mr. McNair and Mr. Gunter early in the evening and built bonfires of victory. Impromptu bands played victory marches and cheer after cheer rent the sky for the respective candidates. After the demonstrations in front of the victors' homes the bands, the cars and the crowd wended their way through the city streets. They stopped long enough in front of the homes of several well known Conservative residents, among them Ald. C. Hedley Forbes who was one of the candidates to let loose their feelings and the bands played the Dead March. Altogether it was an hilarious celebration.

Later in the evening, when it was definitely established that the Liberals had won the crowd of people gathered in front of the city hall where J. B. McNair, H. Ralph Gunter, Stewart E. Durling and Ernest W. Stairs, and His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark, all spoke briefly. The speakers were cheered to the echo, a special salvo greeting Mr. McNair when he stepped out to speak. Each spoke in praise of victory and so great was the noise that little could be heard. It was enough however, that the victors spoke. The singing of the National Anthem brought the impromptu celebration at the city hall to a close.

Although last night's was probably the biggest election celebration witnessed in the capital for many years it was devoid of serious disturbance. The crowd, although it was noisy and demonstrative, refrained from doing damage. There was plenty of good fun mixed with the acclaim paid the Liberal victors.

Firecrackers played a big part in the celebration. Adults and children alike threw them around. Fortunately no damage was done by fire in or about the city, although the fire department was called to the residence of J. B. McNair, where a huge bonfire had been set, paying tribute to Mr. McNair's victory.

Mr. McNair and Ald. H. Ralph Gunter each spoke to the crowds who thronged around their homes, congratulating the electors. From the veranda of his home, Ald. Gunter thanked the electors and also the city.
