LIBERALS IN SWEEPING VICTORY IN N. B. ELECTION, CONSERVATIVES ONLY 5 SEATS

Three in Carleton County and Two in Saint John Were Only Seats Won by Conservatives—Most Decisive Victory in Many Years.

The sweeping victory in the province of New Brunswick at yesterday's history-making election saw all but five of the contesting Conservatives swept out of power. With 43 seats in the new Legislature as against their opponent's 5, the Liberals gained one of the most momentous victories in the history of New Brunswick politics.

Fred C. Squires, E. W. Melville and George W. Perry, the three government candidates, were elected in Carleton county, and Robert McAllister and A. C. Smith were elected in Saint John county, being the only five Conservatives to retain seats in the House. The possibility is that Fred C. Squires will lead the handful of Conservatives who will comprise the Opposition in the new Legislature.

Landslide of Votes

So far as the remainder of the province goes the election proved a veritable landslide of votes for the Liberal party. The inevitable result was known early last evening as returns began to come in from all parts of the province. The first poll heard from—Penniac, York County, might have been an omen, for here all four Liberals led the poll. Reports trickling in from each section of the province thereafter all pointed to the defeat of the Government party. It was a glorious and one-sided victory for the Liberal party in this province.

The next Legislature by having only five members on the Opposition side of the House will establish a record for provincial politics. With only five composing the Opposition, the Liberals will have the magnificent total of 43 seats—setting a record for provincial politics.

GASOLINE IS MADE OF COFFEE BEANS

LONDON. — A remarkable process for making gasoline from shale and vegetable products, such as sugar cane and coffee beans, is to be developed on a large scale in Britain. Negotiations are under way for the erection of an extensive plant near the Wash, as well as in Australia and South Africa.

Extraordinary claims are made for the process, which has been perfected secretly in a little group of workshops and laboratories in London.

Much of the value of the plant is vouched for by one of the most eminent authorities in the world on fuel research. The test plant is the culmination of 40 years' research by N. E. Freeman, an American consulting engineer. It treats any spirit-bearing solid or vegetable. Much depends on an amazing temperature control, operated by a mercury column.

Shale from which yields are obtained here in this plant comes from Scotland, Dorset, Australia, South Africa, Italy Sweden Estonia, Java, Portugal, China and Malay States. Canned coal is used from Scotland, Durham, Northumberland the Midlands, Lancashire, and North Wales. And the vegetable products transformed include sugar cane from which the sugar has been crushed, millet seed from China, cocoa shells, and coffee beans.

Motor spirit from shale, canned coal or torbanite is estimated to cost 6 cents per gallon in the full plant, about 60 per cent of the cost of re-torting systems of equivalent productive capacity.

TURKEY SETS A CODE FOR ITS GRAVEDIGGERS

ISTANBUL, June 28.—In Istanbul Turkish mourners have staged a revolt against the grave diggers.

They say that they charge more than the due fees for burying the dead and bargain speculatively over the corpses.

So many complaints have reached the municipality from the mourning population that it has sent the police a schedule of grave-digging charges which all gravediggers must follow.

It will cost \$3.75 to bury anyone over five years old, and \$1.80 for persons under five.

But for burials in graves which are already open, the charge will be only \$1.

LABELS HAVE FANCY NAMES, CONTENTS OF BOTTLES IS SAME

London, June 28.—"You can't sell whiskey in America under an ordinary name. They want a Scotch name," said Joseph William Hobbs, an American trading here, when he was sued at Westminster Court for a balance of an account for printing labels of varying names and designs for whiskey bottles.

He contended that ten distillery companies and not Hobbs & Co. were responsible. These companies bore such names as Glenbrae, McNab, MacAlpine's, MacIvor and MacVicar's.

The labels bore such brands as "Gentleman's Choice," "Red Shield," "Ancient Mariner" and "MacVicar's Extra Special and Grand Liqueur." The whiskey, Mr. Hobbs explained, was all the same.

MONGOL CHIEFS FORSAKE PONIES FOR RAKING CARS

PEIPING, June 26—Princely descendants of Genghis Kahn no longer gallop across their steppeland domains in Inner Mongolia on wiry, shaggy Mongol ponies.

Mongol princes today are, as a rule, too stout to enjoy such energetic and vigorous travel. But the real reason is that nine out of ten of these prairie Noblemen prefer the speed and comfort of their American built automobiles.

The makes and models of these royal conveyances vary widely. The eccentric ruler of one minor banner owns one of the prize exhibits, a model of the early 20's. Unlike his more patrician fellow princes, Prince Ma usually drives himself. The start of one of his royal progresses is a sight worth watching.
