Barber Federation Officers Arrested

NEW YORK, June 28—Detectives assigned to the office of Attorney-General John J. Bennett jr. arrested the treasurer and six delegates of the American Federation of Master Barbers yesterday in connection with the investigation into alleged racketeering activities in that organization. The seven arrested yesterday bring to sixteen the number arrested in the course of the inquiry. The defendants will be charged with collusion, conspiracy and violation of Article 340 of the general business law which prohibits unlawful restraint or interference with trade.

The complainants are four Brooklyn barbers who claim that their shop windows were smashed when they refused to adhere to price schedules set by the Federation.

Radio Listeners Must Still Suffer

OTTAWA, June 28—The Government does not intend to introduce this session a bill empowering inspectors to prevent interference. Marine Minister Hon. Alfred Durand told A. W. Neill (Ind., Comox-Alberni) in the House yesterday.

FIVE JAPANESE ARMY AVIATORS WERE KILLED

TOKIO, June 27—The Japanese army lost five fliers and three planes today in two disasters bringing to a climax a fortnight of numerous accidents.

Two planes collided and crashed at the army's air base at Kagamigahara, near Gifu, and three men were killed. Another plane from the Kagamigahara air base crashed in flames in the Niigata prefecture and two men perished.

Between June 14 and June 23 the army, navy and air mail services lost eight planes in accidents in Japan, Korea and Manchoukuo in which two persons died and 13 were injured seriously.

Houses of Glass Seen Before Long

DETROIT, June 28—Members of the American Society for Testing Materials were told last night that people in the future may live in glass houses.

In a discussion of materials for modern housing, John Ely Burchard of Boston, vice president of the Bemis Industries, described glass as "the most promising material of all." "The high structural strength of glass is not commonly recognized," he said, "and once it gains, as it is gaining, impact resistance, it will be a formidable competitor to all because it does not wear out, nor tarnish, nor discolor, nor is it subject to the many deteriorations of most other materials."
