> TOKIO, June 27-The Japanese army lost five iers and three planes today in two disasters bringing to a climax a fortnight of numerous accidents.

Two planes collided and crashed at the army's air base at Kagamigahara, near Gifu, and three men were killed. Another plane from the Kagamigahara air base crashed in flames in the Niigata prefecture and two men perished.
