Rev. G. W. Guiou Urges
On H. S. Graduates
Necessity of Work

Splendid Closing

Achievement of Graduation Is As Much a Challenge As a Conquest

Speaking to the graduating class of Fredericton High School at its closing exercises last evening in the auditorium of the school, Rev. G. W. Guiou told the student graduates that the conquest of high school and graduation was as much a challenge to them as it was a conquest. It was a challenge to go out into the world and achieve greater things. "Life and the world are yours to make of them what you will," said Rev. Mr. Guiou.

The local High School graduated 107 students last evening in what proved to be a very entertaining program. The auditorium of the school was filled with people, many of them parents of the students. The programme commenced at 7.30 o'clock with Dr. G. C. VanWart as chairman.

According to reports from other parts of the province, several constables of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in New Brunswick left this week for Regina for duty in connection with the now-famous camp strike there.

Major E. C. P. Salt, commanding "J" Division of the R.C.M.P. here, would make no comment today on the rumor, but he did not deny the report.

The names of Constables Daniel Miller and George Hughes of the New-castle detachment of the Police had been mentioned in the report. Constable Paradis of Bathurst was another. Inspector Bullard, of Halifax, who was recently transferred here, is reported to be in charge of the party.

Major Salt said today that Inspector Bullard was not in the city.

CROPS BETTER IN WAKE OF WARM WEATHER

Agriculture Officials Investigate Crop Conditions in Province

Insect Pests

General Indications Are That All Soil Crops Are Greatly Improved

Officials of the department of agriculture who have been conducting investigation of soil and crop conditions through various parts of the province, find that with but few exceptions the recent spell of warmer, more summerlike weather has improved the crops to a great extent.

There has been a rapid growth, as well as a full greening of root crops with the indication that the season will be an abundant one for the farmers. Insect pests have not been especially harmful this year to date.

Previous to last week conditions were a bit doleful and the farming sections were suffering from drought. Also cold raw weather delayed growth.
