## Devon Slips Up in Second Game

### HOUSE OF DAVID TEAM HAS HAD MANY WINS

MONTREAL, Aug. 20—Here is the latest data about the much talked of House of David baseball team.

The House of David team is composed of some of the fastest players outside the major leagues, most of them could be playing in any Class A or AA league in the country.

Uhas, shortstop, is a right-handed hitter. He is fast, has a wonderful arm and is the spark plug of the team.

Mullen, on second, is a right-hand hitter, a fine fielder and a good pivot man in the double-play combination with Uhas, and they cut short the opponent's rallies.

La Fleur, centre fielder, is one of the most consistent hitters in baseball. Lefty, as the boys call him, can really deliver in the pinch when a hit is needed, is a wonderful fielder and can pitch a good game any time he is called upon to go in the box. He is also the man who handles the bat in the pepper game. He bats left handed.

Strong Arm Scott, the third sacker, has one of the best arms in baseball. It is sure death for the batter, he bats right handed.

Ossie Orwell, formerly with the Athletics, plays right field and pitches. He can still hit them a mile and pitch good ball, is fast on his feet and he runs from the left side of the plate. He also throws left handed.

Orval Wright is the hook arm of the pitching squad, he has everything a good pitcher needs—curve ball and one that is plenty fast. He also hits left handed and he is the pinch hitter of the club.

Miller, Laufer, Walsh and Anderson are the right handers of the club. Miller and Laufer are curve ball pitchers with a good change of pace and both have had plenty of experience and are considered smart pitchers. Laufer is 6 feet 2 inches tall and is known as Handsome Harry.

Anderson is the speed-ball artist of the club, he is what is known as a good night pitcher on account of his baffling speed. He mixes a curve ball with a change of pace, and any time they beat Andy they know they have been in a ball game.

Joe Walsh is only 19 years old and has everything to make a good pitcher. He is known as Sonny Boy Walsh.

Elmer (The Great) Dean starts every game on the mound for the Davids and if his mates don't error behind him they never score on him. For the time he stays in the box he just throws fast ones.

The club has won more than 80 per cent of their games this season. Among their victims is St. Paul of the American Association, and six other clubs of the Northern League. In fact, every club they played, namely Fargo, Grand Forks, Crookston, Brainerd, Superior and Duluth.

### ATTEL CREDITS BOMBER AS BEST HITTER IN GAME

BOSTON, Aug. 19—Now comes Abe Attel, one of the greatest ring champions in the history of the game to add another word, if such is necessary, concerning the punching ability of Joe Louis, that spectacular Brown Bomber from Detroit, who seems destined to some day wear the heavyweight championship toga, if ever such an opportunity is afforded him.

Attel, a familiar race-track figure these days is spending a couple of weeks at luxurious Narragansett, but never loses interest in the game which scaled him into headlines and made him one of the outstanding men of his profession.

"A greater puncher than Stanley Ketchall," is the surprising statement made by Attel and while there will be many to criticize the opinion, Abe points out that he has seen Louis in all his important fights, while he has closely watched him in training.

"And he punches with little or no effort," adds Abe. "His most damaging punches travel only a few inches and he never seems to exert himself. This is always a sign of a good puncher."

Not in 20 years has the cauliflower industry been graced by the presence of such a puncher as Louis, according to the old champion whose word always has been highly regarded in boxing circles. He refuses to compare Louis with some of the other great heavyweights unless it is to compare their punching ability, and Abe insists that the coffee-colored gladiator is tops of them all. Tops of all he has seen, at least, and he doesn't except the Manassa Mauler, Jack Dempsey. Yet Attel isn't exactly alone in his opinion. Since Louis started topping 'em over, he seems to have won over the entire boxing universe. They pointed
